

One or two people have asked me what the plans are for services in the New Year. As you know the church was criticised for not making a strong case to remain open during the first lockdown.

However the government has now been persuaded that going to church is not a leisure activity but an essential part of many people's identity and spiritual life.

Consequently services can continue at present even in Tier 4 with the usual precautions in place. It would seem a shame not to have services when we are permitted to do so. There will be a weekly Sunday Parish Eucharist at the usual times of 9.30am at Icklesham and at 11am at Winchelsea.

I should add that I think it is very important that people who do not feel comfortable for what ever reason should not feel that they have 'a duty' to attend church. If anyone who does feel they would rather not attend but would like to discuss it, they are welcome to give me a ring. There will be no choir in Winchelsea for the immediate future. If you remember in the early part of the summer we held a number of services without music and they were reasonably successful. The situation will be monitored and subject to change.

Let us pray that the coming year may see this pandemic brought under control at least to some extent.



Alan McKinna FRCS

Alan died suddenly on 12th December at the age of 88. He had a highly distinguished career as a surgeon at the Royal Marsden Hospital specialising in the treatment of breast cancer.

Retiring to Winchelsea and worshipping at St Thomas' he became a member of the Church Council and a leader of prayers at Sunday worship. Alan was a wholehearted participant in many aspects of town life, giving generous support to organisations and individuals.

He was Mayor in 2007-8, a trustee of ARRCC, a founder member of Literary Society and its secretary for several years. He convened the art group and could always be relied on to have something to exhibit at Garden Society shows. For several seasons he organised *Carols Round the Town* in aid of *Shelter*, a cause dear to his heart.

More recently, Alan and Mal moved from Ford Madox Ford's house in Friars Road to a flat in Kent Close and he devoted himself to caring for Mal. 'It's in the contract', he would say but, of course, it was very much more than that. A private family cremation will be followed by a celebration of Alan's life when circumstances permit.

Winchelsea Bowls Club

The club now has its own website. Here's part of the report on last year.

2020 started in hope, rather than expectation. As a club, during 2019 we had held our own in the Rother League and most other external competitions in which we were entered, winning the Bayham & Lamberhurst tournament and retaining the Fairwin Trophy.

The green had stood up very well bearing in mind the long hot dry spells and so we were looking forward to improving rather than simply maintaining what we had. And then the rain came, and then Covid-19 came, and then the sun came!

At the beginning of 2020 we had relentless rain which meant that our usually very well drained green couldn't cope and we ended up with puddles in areas where we had not seen them before. Growth in these areas was severely retarded. Just when we would have seen a growth spurt the weather changed. It became as dry as it had been wet, and it wasn't just warm, it was hot!

This happened to coincide with lockdown when nobody could go anywhere, except for Barnard Castle! I cannot remember ever having to use sprinklers in April and May. No matter how much one tries, they are no substitute for proper rain. Over all the result was that we arrived at what would normally have been our open day with a green which was playable, but not looking at all good.

By now, of course, we were in lockdown. This did not preclude us from maintaining the green, indeed, some of us treated it as our 'Borisercise'. We made the decision that we would only open the green for practice by members, once again, writing clear and strict rules which had to be abided by in order to keep the members as safe as possible.

It was pleasing to see members taking the opportunity to enjoy a bit of relaxed sociable, but socially distanced, bowling, whilst showing total respect for the procedures which we had put in place.

The club had to make some tough decisions during the year. Knowing that we would not be receiving income from match fees, match day raffles and general fundraising it was decided that we needed to collect membership fees as normal even though there was a real possibility that members would gain no benefit from being a member during the year. Not only did all members renew, but we were also delighted to welcome a few new members. Fantastic!

National Garden Scheme

Garden openers had to decide back in August on the dates for 2021 charity openings, not knowing how things would develop. In Winchelsea we have plumped for Saturday 17th April and Saturday 19th June. Fingers crossed.

Nationwide, 2019 was a record year with the gardens raising more than £4 million for the first time ever, which would have enabled record donations of £3.3 million. However, faced with gardens closed for a long period and in the knowledge that these openings produce 85% of total income, the NGS had to make a painful decision to reduce donations in order to survive. Nursing and health charities received the bulk of the funds as they always do.

In the event the NGS donated just under £2 million, made cost savings, and between June and October were able to open some larger gardens with pre-booked tickets. Sadly, as many of the Winchelsea gardens are small and timed pre-booking for a group of gardens would have been impossible to administer, we had to remain closed.

Winchelsea Anniversaries

200 years ago

It was in 1821, at the Coronation of King George IV, that the Barons of the Cinque Ports last carried out their traditional right to carry a canopy over the monarch in the Coronation procession.

On receiving the King's Writ requiring the town to nominate 'two fit and proper persons' for this duty the members of the Corporation appointed, as was standard practice in those days, Winchelsea's two MPs, Henry Brougham and Lucius Concannon.

Neither actually attended. Brougham had successfully defended Queen Caroline at the trial which George IV hoped would enable him to obtain a divorce and his presence at the Coronation was therefore unacceptable to the king; Lucius Concannon was ill and, in fact died a few months later.

Sadly the compiler of these notes has not yet been able to discover who actually did represent Winchelsea that day. Whoever they were their duty with the other Barons did not go well.

Many reasons and excuses have been suggested about how and why things went wrong. These include that the

weather was too hot, that the canopy was too heavy, that the Barons had had too little practice, that they insisted on arguing precedence with others in the procession; that there was a scuffle when an attempt was made to steal the canopy's valuable fittings and that the Barons had had too much to drink beforehand!

Whatever may have been the cause, there is a delightful first-hand account of what actually happened. This reads: 'At first all seems to have gone well but on the return to Westminster Hall the elderly Barons began to tire at their task thus causing the canopy to sway from side to side. The king, feeling nervous that it would fall on his head, thought it safest to walk just in front of it.

This, however, did not suit the stout hearts if weak bodies of the barons whose duty it was to carry the canopy over the monarch so they hastened their steps thus causing the canopy to sway even more. The king became genuinely alarmed and, though of portly habit, quickened his pace and, as the canopy surged after him broke into a somewhat unseemly trot. In that manner they all arrived breathless at Westminster Hall!

As a result of this fiasco Honours at Court (the official name of this duty) were not granted for the coronations of King William IV or Queen Victoria. However, although canopies have never been carried since, the Barons of the Cinque Ports were present for all four twentieth century coronations at which other duties were found for them.

Pett Level Independent Rescue Boat

Welcome to 2021 and the latest update from Pett Level Independent Rescue Boat. With the continued national and international crisis, which led to our local tier 4 restrictions, our activities have naturally been reduced, so apologies for this update being a little thin!

When the latest restrictions were announced in December, our operations were scaled back to search, rescue and flooding relief emergencies only and our general activities reduced to just essential checks on the boathouse and equipment. As a result, the presence of our volunteers at the boathouse is minimal, but please be assured that we are rescue-ready to protect users of the coastline, and to respond to flood alerts throughout the current restrictions.

Before this, we'd been quite successful in selling our greetings cards and calendars online, with our volunteers delivering items. However, once nonessential retail was closed down, this fundraising stopped to help keep everyone safe.

As a result, we do still have 2021 calendars for sale, so if anyone in the Winchelsea Parish would like to order some for pick up or delivery once current restrictions are lifted and it is safe to do so, please do contact us. Current pricing is £3 each or 2 for £5. Before the current restrictions, three of our volunteers did manage to squeeze in a socially-distanced visit to Homewood Leisure of Rye because owner Stuart Homewood had a special surprise for us. After reading about our current funding situation in the Rye News, Stuart has kindly donated a £5,000 hot tub as the star prize in a special one-prize raffle.

Tickets have just been printed and although we can't be 'out there' selling them at the moment, our #stayafloat fundraiser launches this month. Tickets cost £2.50 each and are printed in books of 4. With 1000 books available, Stuart's hoping that his prize donation will actually help us raise the £10,000 needed to cover a full year's running costs, to help our rescue charity #stayafloat!

Ring out, wild bells, to the wild sky, The flying cloud, the frosty light, The year is dying in the night; Ring out, wild bells, and let him die.


Ring out the old, ring in the new, Ring, happy bells, across the snow; The year is going, let him go; Ring out the false, ring in the true.


