

Reflections from the Rectory

We are blessed in Winchelsea town to have such a wonderful church right at its centre. It dominates the ancient grid system adopted by Edward I to mirror the bastides of Gascony. Often visitors are amazed by how open and airy our church is; not at all typical for what is essentially a country parish church.

It is a great privilege for me to be able to serve here and I constantly feel uplifted by the surroundings when presiding at our Parish Eucharist. It is not common to be able to have such a commanding view of the surroundings and the worshipping community. As I have mentioned before this is the third church I have been associated with in my ministry that appears in Simon Jenkins' *Thousand Best Churches*; only another 997 to go.

Much of our building goes back to its very foundation in 1288 and the tracery decorating the Alard tomb as well as the unusual split cusp tracery, only known in this part of the country which fills the East window, all speak of the significance of the church. Of course over the years there have been additions but unusually the architectural form probably remains largely unchanged. There have however been other changes over the years. Apart from the monuments and memorials, particularly those on the west wall of the south aisle, the most striking of these changes is our series of windows by Strachan and of course the imposing organ dominating the west wall. As well as commenting on the beauty of the church most people are astonished by the windows and I have never heard anyone suggest that they do not fit in to our late mediaeval building.

Strachan's windows remind us that we are custodians of a living building. The church is not only framed in stone and mortar but it is a place for us to praise God each Sunday and to offer more reflective prayer at other times.

Today all changes and alterations to the building need to be overseen by a body called the D.A.C., the Diocesan Advisory Committee (incidentally I have just been invited to sit on this committee). Sometimes it is regarded as a hindrance to change but it is simply a welcome check on unsuitable and outlandish development. The committee needs to bear in mind that our churches are not just historical monuments they are living buildings and as such they will allow modern additions as long as they are in tune with the character of the place. More often than not they are happy to approve work of quality which affirm that buildings have always grown and changed.

I'm hopeful that in the next year or so we will be able to consider some changes that chart the growth and development of our church and while honouring its ancient heritage also prepare us for the future; reminders that the church has a living spirit.

We have just installed Wifi, which will be fully functional very soon and I very much hope we will be able to move ahead with proposals for lighting, which will not only do justice to the building but also reduce our carbon emissions and electricity bill.

We thank God for a beautiful building and pray for its future and spiritual heart. *Jonathan*



Thanksgiving for the Departed Sunday 7th November at 4pm at St Thomas'

Remembrance - 11th and 14th

On Remembrance Sunday, 14th, at 11am the Mayor will lead the wreath laying ceremony at the War Memorial. All who wish to lay wreaths during the ceremony are welcome to do so. Four house captains will lay a wreath on behalf of the school.

There will then be a Service of Remembrance in the Church, with donations made at that service going to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.

There will be a short Said Eucharist at St Thomas' at 9.30am on 14th.



Poppy Appeal

This year's Poppy Appeal will run from 30th October to 13th November.

There will again be no house-to-house collection in Winchelsea, but donation tins and trays containing poppies and pins will be available at The Farm Kitchen, The New Inn, Winchelsea Lodge, the Co-op, Sutton's Shop, The Ship Inn/Jamie's Butchers and Winchelsea Sands. As ever, donations will be gratefully accepted by the Royal British Legion (RBL) with gift aid being much appreciated.

A stock of gift aid envelopes will be available at the back of the Church for cash or cheques (made payable to RBL Poppy Appeal) and these should be placed in the Black Box in the Church, or in any box at the above locations, before 15 November. The future of St Richard's

It has already been reported that our sister church in Winchelsea Beach is facing serious problems. The church was built in 1961 but now faces a very large bill for restoration works and unfortunately the basic foundations and some of the structure is not sound.

The current position is that the PCC voted unanimously "reluctantly to proceed with the closure of the church subject to the approval of the diocese". A public meeting took place on Wednesday 27th October in the community hall at Winchelsea Beach so that the rector could explain the situation. A little over 30 people attended, including six regular worshippers and seven or eight residents as well as PCC members and other parishioners from the benefice. Disquiet was expressed and there was a general feeling that it would be desirable to save the church, however to date no concrete proposals or suggestions from the local community were put forward.

The Rector expressed the view that any serious efforts to raise money would need to come from the local community, although of course he and the PCC would support initiatives where appropriate. He added that it would have to be considered whether expending large amounts of money and effort (if that was forthcoming) on a building with around six regular worshippers was a Christian response to the situation.

It was also made clear that any decision to close the church would need to be followed by a plan as to what should be done with the building and the land and professional advice would be sought.

It is hoped that future planning would involve the PCC, the local community and the local council. It must however be in accordance with the Charities Act, which should ensure that any outcome was in accordance with the aims of the relevant charity, in this case the PCC of the Parish of Winchelsea, in which the church of St Richard's is situated. Any further proposals for the future will be gratefully accepted and considered.

Whatever happens Winchelsea Beach remains the responsibility of the Rector of Winchelsea and Icklesham and we are committed to maintaining a Christian presence.

The PCC meets on 13th November and it is likely that we will vote to make the necessary commitments to obtain professional advice with regard to the church building and site. It should be noted that it will be several months before it would be impossible to reverse such a decision, although at present, after reflection and prayer, there are no obvious alternatives.

Second Wednesday Onion Domes, Urban Myths and Sponge Cake

After nineteen months of Zoom meetings, a live Second Wednesday Society test event was held at the New Hall, on 13th October.

The architectural historian, Kathryn Ferry, enthralled the audience with her talk "Orientalism on Sea". She was vastly knowledgeable, particularly engaging and welcomed the opportunity to share her passion with us in person. On her way over, she took advantage of the glorious weather and revisited St Leonards, to revel in its architecture and deepen her understanding of her subject matter.

She later posted photos, as well as ones of her trip to Winchelsea, on Twitter, where she can be found <u>@SeasideFerry</u> She explained to us how onion domes became part of the vernacular of British architecture and why so many theatres, pleasure palaces and bingo halls are called The Alhambra.

But one of her most surprising facts was about black painted metalwork and railings. In 1861, upon the death of Prince Albert, according to folklore, Queen Victoria declared "...Paint everything black". This however is an urban myth. As she explained, fast drying black resin paint wasn't invented until the late 1950s. Following Kathryn's oriental tales, the afternoon tea that the Second Wednesday Society is equally well known for was served, but in a quite different fashion to usual. We are very conscious of our place in the Winchelsea calendar and therefore of our responsibility to our members.

For this reason, we made safety our primary concern. The entire afternoon was seated. We gathered in groups of six to enjoy the lecture and were then served cake, sandwiches and tea in situ.

This very successful gathering means we can look forward to Wednesday 10th November with confidence, when our speaker will be the medieval historian Imogen Corrigan. She will talk to us about 'The Cathars'.

On behalf of the Committee, I'd like to thank the many friends, old and new, who have gone out of their way to let us know how much they enjoyed their Wednesday. With careful planning, the concern and apprehension of large gatherings was removed.

The personal attention shown, encouraged a relaxed atmosphere and engendered a sense of joy and community that so many of us have missed these many months. With the strength and courage of a thousand years of history behind us, finding a new way of doing familiar things gives us hope and shows that Winchelsea is also a 21st century town.

Residents' Association AGM

Winchelsea Residents' Association's first AGM will be held on Saturday 6th November at 11.30am at the New Hall. We will be mindful of Covid precautions.

Over the last few months a group of residents has drafted the Constitution, formed an initial committee, created an email address and the domain for a website, opened a bank account and begun consultation with residents about what issues they are most interested in. Over 140 residents have joined as initial members.

The meeting will take the vital next step in formally establishing the WRA, We will consider the administration and governance of the new association, including the draft constitution and the formation of the management committee.

We will then consider how we can begin to get on with our central aim which is to establish and pursue the issues of most interest and concern to residents of Winchelsea. This will include reports on some of the issues which are currently of active concern

A vital first task is to establish a Committee which is able to represent and understand the views of the town. We have nine nominees so far, all of whom have played an active role in getting the WRA up and running to this stage - myself, Richard Plumb, Laurie Rutman, Paul Veys, Catherine Owens, Brian Leonard, Jane Taylor, Linda Bass and Sarah Andrews. We would welcome at least three additional committee members and if you feel you could contribute well on the committee of our new association please let us know by no later than Thursday 4th November.

The Committee will then be elected at the AGM and if additional members are required and available after then, which may especially be the case in this first year, the Committee will use its co-option powers to do this.

There is a lot to deal with at this first AGM and, so as not to overburden the detail of Agenda and ask members to respond to too much in one go, we propose to bring the Constitution back for review alongside a full set of associated rules and polices at our second AGM, which we currently plan to hold in May 2022.

Icklesham Parish Council

Meetings in November

Monday 8th Planning Committee at 6.15, followed by Full Council in the New Hall Winchelsea at 7.15. Monday 22nd. Planning at the Court Hall, Winchelsea. This may be followed by a Committee Meeting if Committees are re-appointed on 8th November.

Council

The Council is now back to a full complement of Councillors. The Winchelsea vacancy having been filled following a formal electoral process at which Cllr Smedley was returned unopposed. The four Icklesham vacancies having been filled by co-option at the last Council meeting.

Contrary to some views, despite the recent vacancies the Parish Council has always been properly constituted, with enough Councillors remaining in office to maintain a quorum, which is 5 Councillors. We have never had less than 7 Councillors in office throughout the difficult period we have just come through.

In addition, we now have both new officers in post and performing their duties well. The new Assistant Clerk is already getting to grips with poor performance by our main grounds maintenance contractor and negotiated a cost reduction in respect of works not carried out in accordance with the contract. There will inevitably be some hiccups along the way as they are both new to local government and training cannot all be done at once.

Traffic calming in Winchelsea

The Consultant is currently preparing proposals for the Council's consideration. He is expected to report before the end of the year.

Winchelsea Beach sewerage problems

Your parish council has been trying to arrange with our MP to hold a public meeting with Southern Water staff in attendance to discuss the ongoing problems and try to move forward towards a more permanent solution than a fleet of tankers that only add to the immediate residents' frustration.

Our MP's view is that the residents would not wish to risk coming to a meeting before the Spring, because of the ongoing issues of Covid. The Parish Council's view is that the sooner we have a meeting the better otherwise the situation will just drag on and on and we may miss the opportunity to get improvements to the sewerage scheme at Winchelsea Beach into the next five-year plan for Southern Water.

We also consider that there is no guarantee that the Covid risk will be any less in six months' time than it is now. We understand that Southern Water are happy to attend a meeting whenever it is called. It would be helpful to have views on this available by 15th November.

Defibrillator

This has been ordered and hopefully will soon be installed on the pavilion at Harbour Field.

The Rye Harbour Signal Mast

The mast (sometimes referred to as a flagpole) has now been repaired and re-erected in its original position adjacent to the new Lifeboat House. Originally erected as a storm signal mast for shipping in the Bay before the days of radio communications, it is an important piece of local and national heritage, and the Parish Council is pleased to play a part in maintaining it in place. The mast was repaired following consultations with Rye Harbour residents, who favoured its retention. The work was carried out locally by Rock Channel Marine, who also supervised the work of re-erecting it.


Imperial Centenary

At the Sunday service in St Thomas, a bell is struck during the communion prayer. It is inscribed with the words *HMS Glowworm 1915* and would have been used to sound the changes of duty watches onboard.

This ship, pictured below, was a river gunboat and, on 1st November 1921, she took her place in history. Berthed at Baja, on the Danube, south of Budapest, she embarked Karl, last Habsburg Emperor and King of Hungary, and the Empress Zita on the first stage of their journey into exile. One week later, they embarked in the cruiser *HMS Cardiff* on the Black Sea for their journey to Madeira.

Glowworm was broken up in Malta in 1927, so it is assumed that a scion of Empire acquired the bell as a souvenir prior to settling in Winchelsea and donating it to the church.





Churchyard Mini-Meadows

We have now completed all our tasks for Autumn and each circle will be known affectionately as Tom, Dick or Harriet and the small area near the ruins is Margot! This helps us to keep tabs on what is happening and being planted in each area.

And look at this marvellous photo taken from a drone by @ClearAirFlying of Winchelsea showing the circles so markedly. It's fantastic to get another perspective on what we are doing!

During October Tom (on the north side of the church next to the High Street), has been sown with a mix of grasses and blue themed meadow flowers and bulbs including Grape Hyacinth (Muscari armenicum), and Allium sphareocephalon.

Dick (with the gravestone in the centre), has a white meadow mix plus Crocus Snowbunting and wild carrot (Daucus carota). Harriet (nearest to German St.) has a yellow and white theme of meadow mix plus Birdsfoot Trefoil and Snake's Head Fritillary.


The lovely plant crooks have gone in around the edges and natural sisal rope attached (expertly spliced by Paul). The crooks are rusting nicely and the rope has tightened up as it has dampened. This has resulted in tension pulling the crooks inwards which may need adjustments (more work for Paul) before the winter sets in.

We have been visited by the Sussex Wildlife Trust, who spent nearly a whole day here. They were very positive and supportive about what we are doing. The mycologist on the team found some quite rare fungi in some areas of the churchyard and I will be bringing you up to date with that in the December edition. It's all very exciting!

Do have a look at what is happening on the soil surface when you pass by as there is already some germination.



James Payne

James died on 3rd October at the age of 81. He lived in Oxfordshire until 2012 when he and Judith moved to Winchelsea. After a career as an auctioneer, James devoted himself to community activities, sorting and valuing donations to St Michael's Hospice and ensuring they were sold for the best price.

He served as churchwarden at Crowl in Oxfordshire and was electoral roll officer at St Thomas'. He took on the task of keeping the Winchelsea churchyard wall weedfree, sang in the choir, and was a museum volunteer. James enjoyed sailing and was a keen philatelist.

Speaking at his funeral, James' oldest friend recalled his commanding 'auctioneer's voice' and celebrated his warm and characteristic chuckle and his ability to engage almost anybody in friendly conversation.

numerous cards and letters I received following the loss of James. The children and I got the impression that he was acknowledged to be quite a character and will be missed by the whole community, not just family. How fortunate I am that we chose to settle in Winchelsea.

Henry Dormer

Henry Dormer died on 9th October. Born in Suffolk in 1924, he served in the Royal Artillery during the War, fighting in France and Germany and taking part in the liberation of Belsen. When the War ended, he continued to serve as a professional soldier, rising to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

After spending the final decade of his working life as a civil servant in Whitehall, Henry moved with Sue to Winchelsea. He became a freeman of the town in 1990 and served two terms as mayor, from 1995 to 1997, presiding over the celebrations for the 700th anniversary of the Winchelsea mayoralty.

Henry was involved in many aspects of local life. He chaired the New Hall committee and took great delight in Winchelsea Singers both as a performer and in writing material for their famous fun evenings.

Latterly, Henry and Sue moved to Sarre in Kent, but he wanted Winchelsea to be his final resting place, a wish fulfilled following his funeral at St Thomas' on 26th October.


