Discover Winchelsea

Winchelsea is one of the Cinque Ports,
an historic town in an Area of Outstanding Natural
Beauty on the East Sussex coast

With surrounding countryside protected by the
National Trust, there are spectacular views along the
Brede Valley and across Rye Bay to Dungeness

Winchelsea is one of the best preserved
medieval planned towns in the country, with streets
laid out on a rectangular grid pattern

Founded in the late thirteenth century as a port by
King Edward I, it replaced Old Winchelsea which was
swept away by ferocious storms and the rising sea

Winchelsea Corporation

The story of the Corporation stretches back to the thirteenth century and the Mayor and Jurats governed the town until relatively modern times

Now a charity with no local government powers or public funding, the Corporation has stewardship of the medieval town gates and Court Hall. It runs the Museum, publishes the *Winchelsea Town Guide* and maintains the town website

The Mayor continues to represent Winchelsea at the ceremonial and civic events of the Cinque Ports' towns. The Corporation is able to fulfil its charitable objectives through the generous support of the local community





The Museum contains displays and exhibits that illustrate the history of Winchelsea. Located in the High Street, the Court Hall dates back over 700 years. It is the home of Winchelsea Corporation and in its time has served as the town gaol and community hall. Here the most famous Victorian actress, Ellen Terry, passed on her skills to Winchelsea children

Exhibits include maps, models, pictures, pottery and items relating to daily life. Staffed by knowledgeable local volunteers, the museum is regularly open from Spring to Autumn with books and other gifts on sale

Opening times are posted on winchelsea.com where you will find lots of information about the history of Winchelsea

The Court Hall Museum



Considered one of the finest church buildings in Sussex, St Thomas's was planned to be of cathedral proportions with a nave extending almost to the churchyard wall. The ravages of the Hundred Years' War left it severely damaged and only the chancel remains

The remarkable stained glass windows were designed by Douglas Strachan and installed between 1929 and 1933

The Alard tombs are St Thomas's most important relics. The Alards were Winchelsea's most significant family and their tombs were placed here in the fourteenth century. Comedian Spike Milligan lived in nearby Udimore and is buried in the churchyard


The Winchelsea Cellars

The stone-vaulted cellars are an important part of the town's medieval history. You can easily identify the cellar entrances at ground level, but the size, scale and beauty of what lies below can only be appreciated by a visit underground

Built around 1300, thirty-three accessible medieval cellars still exist and the sites of another seventeen are known
Only Southampton has similar numbers of the same quality

Volunteers lead regular tours of a selection of the cellars from Spring to Autumn. Visit winchelsea.com to read more about their history and to book a tour





Walks and Views

See the town map in the centre fold for the places to go to get the best views

- Looking west from the *Millennium Beacon* you can admire unspoiled country views along the Brede valley
- Looking east from *The Lookout* at the end of the High Street you can enjoy the sea view of Rye Bay with Dungeness beyond
- From North Street you can see across to Udimore and Rye
- A stroll southwards along Wickham Rock Lane takes you to the *New Gate* which was once the only way out of Winchelsea by land
The gate is about fifteen minutes' walk from the church

The 1066 Country Walk comes through Winchelsea

The route winds through the countryside that witnessed the Norman Conquest, starting in Pevensey, passing through Battle and finishing in Rye

The Royal Military Canal skirts the east of the town

The Canal Path runs south to the sea at Pett and north to Rye passing the impressive Tudor shell of Camber Castle



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Travel Information

Regular bus services run between Hastings and Rye
The 100 via the A259 stops in the centre of Winchelsea
The 101 via Winchelsea Beach stops at the Sea Road
junction on the Rye side of Winchelsea
 $\frac{1}{3}$ mile below the Strand Gate

The railway station lies a mile from the centre of
Winchelsea and is served by trains on the Marshlink Line
which runs from Ashford International to Eastbourne
via Rye and Hastings
