Reflections from the Rectory

It is already in the middle of April and I hope that by the time you see this the swifts will have returned to Winchelsea Church. Seeing the blossom break and the trees spring forth their leaves in this beautiful part of East Sussex, I am always happy when the swifts arrive.

They depart again by early August and the skies are graced with their presence and the wonderful screeching sound that they make for only three months each year. Their arrival and the burgeoning of spring are a time for hope and thanksgiving.

However there is much too unsettle us at this time. Those of us who felt that the passing of the pandemic would allow life to resume some kind of normality have been shocked by the war in Ukraine. But if we are honest with ourselves, war and famine and the outrage of violence between men is not new. It is just that in the Ukraine it is nearer.

This endless balance of joy and fear is part of life. As a Christian, the season of Easter always reminds me of this. You will read this after we have passed through the drama of the Easter story. Maundy Thursday, the celebration of the Last Supper and the Washing of the Feet, moves us to the shocking events of Good Friday – injustice and a merciless death on a cross: reminders of the horrors taking place in the world today. They give

way to the emptiness of Holy Saturday, that period of waiting and wondering and then at last to the day of Resurrection.

The way Christ overcomes death is more eternal and profound then the return of the swifts and the onset of summer but both are signs of hope. I wish you all every blessing for the Easter season. The message of the gospels is that the Lord is with us until the end of the age.

NGS Garden opening awards



Affordable Housing



Winchelsea Residents Association

The Winchelsea Residents Association held its second general members meeting on 23rd April with a good attendance in the New Hall. Members heard reports of progress on several issues.

On the proposed traffic calming scheme the WRA had encouraged the parish council to arrange a public meeting at which all Winchelsea residents and businesses can hear about and provide views on the options considered to date. The parish council has now confirmed the meeting date 21st May at 11am in the New Hall. GTA consultants, the author of the options study published in December 2021, will be present. This will be the opportunity to ask questions of the consultant and other parties involved in the project to date.

On public toilets there has been the success of the opening of the disabled toilet for general use, which happened at Easter. WRA is urging further action by Rother to enable the women's toilet to open. All of this are steps towards finding a permanent solution.

New issues were also raised at the meeting. The WRA Committee plans to set up a new group to support improvements to the A259 along the whole route to the north and west sides of the town.

Plans for a new Social Activities group, to complement and coordinate existing activities, were also announced. Any residents wishing to contribute to either of these groups are very welcome.

Members raised the issue of accessibility in the Town with concerns about the absence of adequate drop-curbs along the pavements. WRA will be exploring how it can help and report back to members.

WRA welcomed as guest speaker Cllr Jonathan Vine-Hall, Lead Member for Strategic Planning and Chair of the Planning Committee at Rother District Council. Jonathan outlined the potential benefits and practicalities of neighbourhood plans, which had been adopted by several villages in Rother. He said that a neighbourhood plan enabled communities to have more influence and control over decisions taken by the district council.

In Winchelsea, a plan would not encompass housing development but it could focus on design, given the special character of the town. Other wider planning related issues could also be covered. It was recognised that establishing a plan would require strong support and considerable resources and commitment from local residents. The WRA would welcome views from residents about whether a neighbourhood plan would be worthwhile and, if there is obvious support, who may be willing to give their time and relevant experience in researching and drafting such a plan.

Finally, members were reminded that the association's first AGM will be held on 2nd July at 2pm in the New Hall, when the constitution and other arrangements established last year will be reviewed and the committee will welcome interest from any members wishing to join the committee during 2022-23.

Millennium Artefacts Society

After the hiatus of the last two years during which the Winchelsea Millennium Artefacts Society was unable to hold its annual art show, we have however since then been able to fulfil our commitments to maintain two of our three town artefacts.

This year we designed a new stand for the Tapestry which is housed in St. Thomas' Church. It has been expertly made by a local craftsman in oak in keeping with the woodwork in the church. It is now on wheels so can be moved around freely to the delight of the rector and the church wardens.

At the end of last year we commissioned the successful remaking of the Beacon's basket ready for this year's Celebrations for Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The lighting of the Beacon will begin the weekend of the town's celebration starting on Thursday 2nd June.

Winchelsea will be part of this national occasion when 1500 beacons of all kinds will be lit around our shoreline and beaches, from hill tops, castle battlements, on church towers, village greens around the country where celebration will also take place to provide a lasting reminder of the historic moment in the life and reign of the Queen.

As a national event the Pageantmaster's timetable for the beacon lighting is very precise when all of the 1500 beacons will be lit at the same time. If we had a town crier a proclamation would be made at 1.00pm on the day that beacons will be lit in the evening and a piper will play the specially composed *Diu Regnare* at 9.35pm before the beacons are lit at 9.45pm

The Winchelsea Millennium Artefacts Society invite you to a Reception in the New Hall at 8pm where there will be a cash bar. The Mayor will introduce the proceeding for the evening, The Rector will say a prayer followed by the National Anthem and then the piper will play the anthem as we process to the Beacon.



Goddesses, Muses and Spirit

May, named after Maia, the Ancient Greek Nymph. Her name means Mother or Growth. Without us having to lift a finger, she's already given us joyous displays of wildflowers, spring flowers and blossom.

For the Romans, Flora was the Goddess of flowers and fruit. And from the Pagan calendar, the first few days of May bring us the bold, loud, fantastical Jack in the Green. We still have one of the UK's largest celebrations on our doorstep in Hastings. In the rest of the country May Day events include the crowning of May Queens, Morris Dancers and dancing around the Maypole.

Of late I've been unable to watch the news; the tragedy unfolding in Eastern Europe has become unbearable. Instead I've immersed myself in my original love, History of Art and binge watched the major new BBC series "Art that Made Us".

In History of Art you learn that perceived history is written by the victors, but the true reflection of a society and the times in which they lived, is in the Art of the day. Literature, Music, Poetry, Architecture, Painting and Sculpture are the mirror of their era.

Art and more specifically Statues, was the subject our April Speaker, Andrew Ashton, came to talk to us about at Second Wednesday. From their allegorical and commemorative origins in the Ancient Civilisations, think Muses or Emperors; through to their political statements of power, privilege and flattery, as typified during the Victorian era; and back to representations of human endeavour and emotion in modern times, such as the Statue of Liberty or the Angel of The North.

He explained to us how our view of Greek and Roman Statues is in fact just modern folklore. With our narrow eye and our tendency to want to keep everything in aspic, we attribute them with ideals of purity and grace not intended at the time of their creation. We turn a blind eye to their original meaning and context. Like the buildings and temples of the era, they were in fact brightly painted. Walking through Ancient Athens or Rome, we would have recognised a modern high street, not a gallery in the V&A...

One of my personal favourites is the Fourth Plinth in Trafalgar Square. Ever changing, it is alive with the 21st century. In 2009 Anthony Gormley's exhibit, "One and Other", put a different member of the public on the plinth for an hour, over the course of 100 days. They were free to do what they wanted for that hour. I applied for one of the 2,400 spots, but didn't get picked. I was in good company though; Gormley applied too and wasn't selected either.

Dance is another of the Arts that reflects the spirit of a People. The need to gather, share and express your feelings communally, through synchronised movement, remains one of the ways in which a culture creates and maintains its social cohesion and identity. Who better therefore, than Paul Youlten and Maddy Coelho to talk to us about the History and evolutionary pathway of Scottish Dancing. Paul is part of the Management Committee of the Royal Society of Scottish Country Dance, in Edinburgh. Maddy teaches Scottish Country Dancing in the New Hall on Thursdays.



Cricket Field gates

The Cricket Club and the National Trust have received a lot of comments regarding the locking of the gate behind the Pavilion and also the gate into the field from the New Hall decking. The Cricket Club are tenants of the National Trust and pay rent to look after and use the field for cricket.

The field is not a public recreation ground as many might think, it is private property, with access via a gate on the A259 which is a public byway. The public byway crosses the field to the fields beyond by the allotments. This access has never been locked and is the only entrance for the public onto the field.

The Cricket Club land is being abused by dog walkers, personal dog walking and training groups from Hastings and the surrounding area. They have used the cricket square, although fenced off, for their training, and are allowing the dogs they look after to run wild on the field and not picking up the dog litter.

The ground has also recently been used by a private personal fitness club, who run classes on the field. For the time being the gate behind the Cricket Pavilion and the one in front of the New Hall decking will remain locked. The gates will be unlocked on the afternoons there is a home game.

The access will remain as always from the kissing gate on the A259. We do not wish to upset the local Winchelsea dog walkers, but we do ask that when crossing the field that the dogs are kept on leads and any dog litter picked up by the owner. There is a bin for the dog litter on the rails between the kissing gate and the New Hall.

No Mow May


May is a busy month and since 2019 has become synonymous with the No Mow May campaign started by the charity Plantlife *plantlife.org.uk*.

Essentially the idea is that if you mow less often, then the pollen count will rocket. Research shows that most people mow every two weeks at this time of year, which leads to far less nectar being available for pollinators.

Winchelsea is full of lovely gardens and some good swathes of lawn. You could help increase available nectar by mowing less often or not at all during May (and June/ July), which is a crucial time for wildflowers and grasses, bees, butterflies and insects.

During Summer why not leave your mower in the shed, cut every 3 or 4 weeks, leave areas of long grass, mow selectively. Selective mowing can be incorporated into the lawn by creating paths and patterns. In the churchyard we will be leaving some areas of unmown grass throughout the summer to see what develops. Can you help pollinators too?


WAS Iham walk repeated


