Platinum Jubilee Weekend

At 8.40 the pipe tune composed for the Jubilee, *Diu Regnare* was played and at 9.45 the beacon was lit to coincide with the lighting of over 2000 beacons in the UK and throughout the Commonwealth.

On Friday afternoon an organ concert featuring light music and a singalong took place in the Church followed by tea and cake.

Saturday morning saw a very busy Church Market incorporating a popular sale of scarves and handbags. A celebratory Jubilee cake was served and enjoyed with coffee. During the afternoon a sale of engravings and water colours, being excess stock from the museum, took place in the Court Hall, with every item being quickly sold.

On Sunday morning the Parish Eucharist incorporated a Service of Thanksgiving in celebration of her Majesty's 70 year reign. At 1 pm the Jubilee Picnic took place on the cricket field to the accompaniment of the Hooe Silver Band. At 4 pm Morris Dancers performed for us and the afternoon concluded with a toast to Her Majesty followed by three rousing cheers.

In conclusion I would like to thank all those who played their part in making the Jubilee Weekend such a resounding success.

Winchelsea Anniversaries 2022 125 Years Ago

It was in 1897 that Miss Maud Peel, former owner of *The Mermaid* in Rye and a niece of the former prime minister, Sir Robert Peel, came to Winchelsea in search of a new home. She had seen advertised for sale by auction a house, shop and premises in Castle Street.

Attractions of the property were advertised as including, 'A partly walled Garden with Wood Lodge, Van Lodge and Stable with Loft over; also a piggery adjoining. The spring water is laid on and there is also an underground rainwater tank.' A second lot was for sale as building land with a frontage of 80 feet to Castle St.

This property we now call *The Armoury* and we owe to Miss Peel its complete renovation and the fact that the potential building land remains undeveloped. When she first saw the property its condition and circumstances were unfortunate indeed.

This was once one of Winchelsea's most thriving businesses, a bakery which served the town and the area efficiently and profitably. John Sharp, the proprietor, was energetic and enthusiastic; also the owner of St. Leonard's Mill where he ground his flour. He greatly increased his sales, built a large brick oven against the north wall of the house to allow extra production, and on his death the whole flourishing concern passed to his

son of the same name. Sadly John Sharp junior inherited his father's business but not his acumen. Sales fell, areas of property were sold off, even the mill was disposed of to help support the family. This tragic decline was observed silently but with deep sorrow by John Sharp senior's widow. By the time that even her home was in the hands of Messrs. Vidler, Son and Clements, the only visible sign of the premises' former use was 'one sad cottage loaf, resting on its side against the misty pane of a bow window [looking] out onto the street.'

When Miss Peel arrived, accompanied by the estate agent, she was prepared to find the property in a state of dilapidation, but not for the scene of human distress on which she stumbled. In the brick floored bakehouse they came upon, seated and silhouetted against the dark, dusty background, was a lonely figure, the aged mother of the owner, a bowl on her knee over which she was peeling potatoes.

Miss Peel described how. 'The bent figure, her head covered with a coloured kerchief, moved not. Silently and unheedingly she continued her work, not even raising her head when, with a few words, I apologised for the intrusion. Poor soul! How could she in any sort respond with her sore heart and so soon to leave the home to which she had come as a wife, in her much younger days, proud of her husband, of his work, and of the position he had made, and now to go forth and end her days elsewhere.

Having purchased the home so painfully left by the old lady, Miss Peel set about a major restoration and reconstruction, living opposite at *The Castle Inn* while the work was done, and leaving The Armoury much as we see it today with the Castle Street frontage quite transformed. She became a pillar of the community, supporting the church particularly, and acquired, apparently as a charitable exercise, the properties of Barrack Square which she let to local people at rents which during her lifetime became largely uneconomic but were nevertheless not increased.

There's always something going on in Winchelsea and we are very blessed to have such a lively and varied community. In the life of the church we will celebrate our Patronal Festival on the 3rd July. As our patron saint, St Thomas of Canterbury was martyred on the

29th of December 1170 we do not normally commemorate him on that date but we remember the translation of his remains on the 7th of July 1220 to the shrine in Canterbury Cathedral which survived until 1538 when it was dismantled by the order of Thomas Cromwell during the English Reformation and Dissolution of the Monasteries.

Following two years of restricted services I'm delighted that we are welcoming Bishop Nicholas Reade, who I believe led worship during a previous interregnum, to preach and preside. He is very much looking forward to coming and preaching and celebrating with us.

We are also blessed that the Occasional Consort will sing the mass in D major by Antonio Salieri as part of the service, which will take place in the presence of the Mayor and Corporation.



Wildflower circles in full bloom

Gardeners often express their gratitude to God with a simple prayer: "Lord, you provide the seed, the rain, the light and the warmth to bring forth the miracle of growth."

The wildflower circles are in full bloom now. The 'blue circle' has a fabulous and very 'Instagrammable' swash of cornflowers. The 'white circle' has a frothy display of oxeye daisies, and the pale yellow flowers of the yellow rattle easily spotted in the 'yellow circle' have turned into papery dry seed pods that really do rattle in the breeze as they scatter their hugely valuable seed that should germinate next spring.

While the wildflower circles look great now, in mid-June, at the start of May we were seriously worried. The circles had plenty of "Weald Native Origin Seeds". There was plenty of sunlight and occasionally even some warmth. But, despite our prayers, less than half the average amount of rain had landed on Winchelsea.

According to data collected by Southern Water, just 212mm of rain fell on East Sussex between November 2021 and April 2022. The average amount is 460mm. The miracle of seed germination and growth stuttered and then failed. Bare ground was all too obvious in the

three wildflower circles. Only grasses with previously established deep roots thrived. Unfortunately, these grasses were the remnants of the turf we removed last October, not the more delicate grasses included in the seed mix designed especially for use in wildflower meadows growing in the High Weald Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.



At the start of May a kindly parishioner offered to weed the sad looking circles. Jim, Shirley and Paul rigged up a long chain of hoses and watering cans to allow the cracked soil to be briefly quenched. New seeds were added and squashed into the bald patches. Prayers for precipitation were repeated, rain dances were considered.

Thankfully, not long after we started the evening irrigation, rain clouds returned and gently, very gently, dropped not just the long term average of 52mm of rain but 53mm, one whole extra millimetre. Enough to make the circles flowery, but not quite enough to stop us worrying a little about the future.

Garden visits raise thousands

Visitors to Winchelsea Beach gardens contributed £4,135 to St Michael's Hospice on 11th June and the opening of *Beauchamps* in Float Lane on the same afternoon raised £1,000 for Ukraine

The main National Garden Scheme opening in Winchelsea on 18th June raised over £7,000, mainly for the medical and nursing charities the NGS supports.

£500 will go to Friary Gardeners which offers horticultural training and greater independence to adults with a wide spectrum of learning difficulties. The charity is based on the ridge in Hastings but started at *Greyfriars* in Winchelsea; hence the name. They also ran a plant stall on the day.

Grateful thanks to the large numbers of people in the town who contributed - helping at garden gates, baking cakes and serving teas, staffing the car park.

The Winchelsea gardens opened again on the afternoon of 19th June, which enabled the Friends of the Hospital at Rye to raise £1,000 for their projects.

Costa Rica possibly the most successful democracy of the Americas. It is supposed to have been named The Rich Coast by Christopher Columbus in 1502. In 1948 a short and bloody civil war, altered her fate forever. The new president abolished the army, enshrining this decision into the constitution. Money was instead poured into education and health. Deforestation was halted by giving financial incentives to landowners.

This has now been expanded to include conservation of biodiversity, protection of clean water and carbon storage. In 1989, the country's foreign dept was renegotiated so that the money could be reinvested into environmental conservation.

In 1994, the constitution was amended again, to include the right of every person to live in a healthy and ecologically balanced environment. In 2007 they announced their aim to become carbon neutral by 2021. Not just a list of dates, but a "How to" blueprint. Today Costa Rica is a world leader in ecotourism.

Michael will share his deep knowledge with us, proving that ecology and environmentalism aren't just theories on a wish list, but necessary and doable for a successful future. See you all on the 13th.



Here are the results of the Open Traffic Calming Meeting (21/05/22) held by IPC and published on their web site. As with the outcome of the Open Spaces Committee Meeting (07/03/22), there was once again a decisive majority in favour of the option for **no right turn** (heading down Strand Hill onto the A259 towards Rye) and **no left turn** (heading up Strand Hill from Rye on the A259).

Our Charity Stall is in full swing every Sunday, from 10am to 4pm. We have been overwhelmed with such a generous selection of donations so do pop down to see all the goodies on offer! From buckets and spades to homewares and lovely paintings, there is something for everyone.

Thanks to donations, we have been able to purchase much needed new dry suits for our crew. We have been so pleased to team up with Northern Diver who have been incredibly helpful and supportive to ensure we have the most appropriate kit for going to sea in all weathers. Not only that, with thanks to the Co-Op and other donations, we have installed CCTV around the PLIRB station. With increasing footfall and some recent incidences in the areas, we give our thanks to those who have donated to ensure we are protected.

The training we do is immensely important and prepares us for all challenges and situations we may face. In June we were tasked, close to midnight, in a multi-agency search to find two missing teenagers who had become lost between Cliff End and Fairlight Glen.

With three UK Coastguard teams and the police, we were asked to conduct a shoreline search. A huge effort in the dark with a receding tide and treacherous rocks, the casualties were located, brought on to the PLIRB rescue boar and returned safely to the slip.

Without local support and our training, these kind of operations would not be possible. It is also a great reminder to always be aware of tides, cliff falls, weather and location conditions.


Rye Harbour Sailability




