Reflections from the Rectory

Dog Days bright and clear Indicate a happy year; But when accompanied by rain, For better times, our hopes are vain.

The last days of July into mid-August are often called the dog days. Heralding the warmest time of the year when Sirius the dog star rises above the horizon in the northern hemisphere. The traditional rhyme above reminds us that fine weather at this time of year was traditionally considered a blessing. Now of course with the anxiety of global warming and drought in our gardens we wish for rain.

There is no doubt in my mind that the summers are getting warmer but there have always been fluctuations in the weather and next year we may bewailing too much rain. In this area we are about to enter a hosepipe ban and for those of us keen on the garden we will have to face up to the fact that not everything can be watered and nurtured.

There is a limit to the control that we have over our environment and our lives for that matter. That is not a reason to be complacent but we are well advised to worry about what we can change and achieve and not waste energy on things we cannot control. As we face the challenge of climate change most of us can only support initiatives that strive to reduce the impact of human activity on our environment. But there are many little things we can do such as making sure we only boil enough water for our immediate needs — not filling the kettle for one cup of tea, which I am sometimes guilty of.

It is not only climate change that looms as challenge. We are faced with an economic crisis and again we should reflect on what we can do to help others, just as many responded to the need to support refugees from Ukraine. Within in the church community we are generally quite good at supporting local charities but I fear that there will be many more in our immediate area in the coming months who will face real financial hardship.

I commended a charity called Acts 435 to those in church recently. It is aimed at helping people with various and specific needs and its great strength is that donations go directly to those who require support. It is worth having a look at their website acts435.org.uk

But however we respond to need let us first consider the things we can do, whether little or more far-reaching and leave the rest to God.

Aid for Ukraine - a personal story

Shirley and Jonathan Meyer write: We are very proud of our lovely and dynamic eldest daughter, Charlotte, who felt she had to do something personal to help the situation in Ukraine, rather than just donating money. Charlotte's colleague, Lucy, had a Ukrainian contact who lives in the UK and had been arranging aid trips.

They were told that what was most needed in Ukraine were toiletries and medical supplies but particularly trucks and four-wheel drive vehicles which would cope with the poor roads in war torn areas.

Undaunted, they made a plan to buy a second-hand vehicle, fill it with supplies and drive it all the way over to a rendezvous in Krakow, Poland. Along with two colleagues from work they started fundraising.

As a family, we must thank all the generous people of Winchelsea who donated towards these funds which made the whole plan possible.


It was very exciting getting everything underway and when they finally reached their target her words were "Oh, crikey! I've got to do it now!" A local contractor in Wiltshire came up with the truck and supplies included toiletries, food, blankets, sleeping bags, sanitiser, nappies, baby formula and many other supplies.

They managed the journey from Wiltshire to Krakow, which took only 48 hours, by doing a driving relay.

Update on St Richard's

Against the background of the intended sale of the building, the Church continues to be used on an occasional basis for secular and religious purposes.

The building is not being neglected and it is intended to rectify the structural issue with the south gable end, which I mentioned in my last update. Pleasingly the insurance company has offered significant help with this and it is likely that work will be undertaken in August or September. It is expected to take five days to complete and will involve the erection of scaffolding and some vegetation clearance. The cost to the PCC is likely to be less than £400.

The other matter that has to be resolved is the fate of ashes that have been interred over the years adjacent to the building. We are currently preparing to apply for a faculty to remove all the cremated remains from St Richard's and re-inter them at St Thomas's.

The Registrar is guiding us through this process. One of the key elements will be making sure we have made every effort to contact the relatives or next of kin of those whose remains were buried at St Richard's.

Through local knowledge and contacts we have traced around 20% of those involved. You will find the names of all the people whose relatives have not yet been traced at the very end of this magazine. If you have any local knowledge in this respect please contact the Rector.

We will be posting local notices and advertisements in the local newspapers. It is not clear how long this process will need to take at this stage but it is hoped that we can meet most of the requirements by the autumn.

While these matters proceed, I again assure residents that I would be very pleased to receive their views on this, or any other matter concerning St Richard's.

A school PE t-shirt (Castle class suggestion)





Winchelsea Anniversaries 325 Years Ago

It was in 1697 that Celia Fiennes visited Winchelsea and left us an account of that visit. Her first view of the area came as she gazed out from the top of Rye Hill.

She saw the sea 'with a great tract of land on each side that is choked up with sand, which formerly was a good haven for ships. The sea does still come up to Rye town as yet but it is shallow and the Castle which stands a little distance a mile is also left of the sea.

This is Winchelsea Castle [as Camber Castle was known for 200 years] but all between it and Winchelsea is nothing but quagmire and marshes, drained in some places by ditches.

Celia Fiennes continued her journey on horseback along the Udimore Ridge and crossed the Ferry Bridge to Winchelsea. There she remarked that it had once been a large place with 'Thirty-six (sic) large squares of buildings'. Now she saw mostly remains of walls, churches and halls.

She rode up the main street, saw the regular intersections and commented, 'but elsewhere the grass grows now where Winchelsea was, as was once said of

Troy'. There were very few houses and she thought the mayor, jurats and freemen must make up the majority of the inhabitants'. Nevertheless, 'Mr Mayor's house' and the parsonage receive favourable comment.

Her pessimistic view of the condition of the harbour was confirmed the following year when visiting commissioners came to the conclusion that there was no way the harbour at the Camber could again be made useful for the navy as it had once been and gave detailed reasons, drawing attention, among other things, to the eastward drift of the shingle, the sandbars, and the extreme shallowness of the haven.

It was Celia Fiennes who, in the same year, drew attention to a tradition that 'If the Lord Mayor of London meets the Mayor of Winchelsea, the Mayor of Winchelsea must have precedence'. This almost certainly dates from the later thirteenth century when Lord Mayors of London had been behaving in a way that gave much offence to the monarch.

London's mayoralty was therefore withdrawn for fifteen years with the city directly governed by the monarch. During the same period Winchelsea's mayoralty continued uninterrupted as it has done now for almost seven hundred and thirty years.

August and the cyclical nature of nature

Shirley Meyer writes: It is August now and our wonderful swifts will be leaving us soon for their long flight back to Africa. I will miss them so much. They are such a big part of summer in Winchelsea. Even during the pandemic when the skies were "silent" they came back to give joy and entertainment. Statistically though, swift numbers are down. According to the RSPB the UK has seen numbers plummeting, with a 53% decline between 1995 and 2016. We must continue to work hard, as a community, to encourage them to flourish.

Winchelsea is a great pro-active community already. People have joined together in a large variety of groups, each with a common cause. As a close -knit community Winchelsea residents rely on and look after each other. Along with friends and family groups we can re-discover the meaning and truly wonderful feeling of working as part of a good team to achieve something of significance, like protecting declining species.

Personally, I feel really grateful to have been accepted here so readily. As a wildlife enthusiast since I was young, it has been a privilege to be given the opportunity to develop my love of plants particularly, by collaborating with interested people on the Biodiversity Project in the churchyard.

At first, the possible changes such as stripping turf, were seen as a big step into the unknown but the first year has been successful overall and feedback has been excellent. Moving on into next year, planting and maintenance will need constant adjustment.

The project has now come full circle. We started defining the circles with yellow string on 25th August 2021 and almost a year to the day we will start harvesting on 27th August this year. The grasses and flowers will be cut and left for about two weeks to dry and release their seeds. Then we will need help with the raking!

In the earth plants will rest. Soil will re-balance ready for next year. It will be the quiet time. The circles will look flat and uninteresting for a while but take time to reflect on what they have meant to us this year.

At their height, they were a beautiful living picture of creation, attracting many and varied insects, butterflies and moths (all those important pollinators we need and without which we would have no food). Pollinators are fascinating in themselves and a small group of enthusiasts, calling ourselves Winchelsea Wildlife, have been monitoring them over the last year.

We hold regular moth trap events once a week over the summer, identifying and counting species. We have also started regular bee walks around Winchelsea with similar aims in mind. What we are doing here is already a start to protecting and nurturing our small area of the global ecosystem.

Hold these pictures in your mind and you cannot help but look forward to next year in anticipation of new growth and the return of the swifts.




Autumn Show

Winchelsea Garden Society will be holding their Autumn Show on Saturday 10th September in the New Hall.


Categories include flowers (with a separate section for dahlias) floral art, vegetables, fruit and handicrafts.

From a very young age I have been used to collecting words. I have a Greek father who rejoices in using words like "assignation" and "fiduciary", so these words slip easily in and out of my speech. Unfortunately I've never had the heart to tell him that these are Latin words.

Last Second Wednesday, I learned a lovely new word, this time courtesy of Michael Howard our National Trust Ranger; Chachalaca. Unfortunately my chances of being able to casually drop this word into a sentence are very limited. It's one of the 850 species of birds that you can see and hear in Costa Rica. It's also known as the Chicken Bird, and it forms part of the Ortalis group, from the Greek for 'hen'. My father would be pleased.

Just one of the amazing facts that Michael dropped into his talk. He illustrated his lecture with the fabulous photos that he had taken on his journeys, ridiculously true to scale models, but most fun of all, recordings of their song.

And another fact; did you know that the iridescent plumage of the Hummingbird has more colours in it than all other birds put together. Well you do now, courtesy of the Second Wednesday Society.

There was a last day of school feel to the afternoon. With this year's Speaker No2, Bill Doherty and Speaker No5, Paul Youlten, also in attendance as we finished off the final part of our programme before the summer break.

But life in Winchelsea doesn't stop just because we do. August 6th had the Church Market in the morning and Film Night in the New Hall in the evening. 
Together with the first two walks - 'Castle Field and Iham' and 'Winchelsea in the front line of the nation's defence', we now have detailed material describing four




