


# Traffic Calming vote closes on Sat 5th

The town meeting in the New Hall on 22nd July was packed out. Our MP and Rother ward councillors were present as Icklesham Parish Council Vice Chair, David Smedley led the meeting through the pros and cons of the options currently on the table - to close Strand Hill, to close it to downhill traffic or to make no change.

The issues are clearly deeply felt. Residents bore witness to their own experience of dangerous traffic speeding through the town and along the A259. People living in Tanyard Lane and Rectory Lane expressed their concern that less traffic in the High Street would inevitably mean more traffic on the trunk road, transferring risk from one part of the town to another. Stephen Rumsey spoke about the possible implications for the Little Shop. The complexity of dealing with roads that are under the jurisdiction of Highways England on the one hand and East Sussex Highways on the other was clear. The town can make recommendations but cannot compel the highway authorities to act.

The vote is open to all residents of Winchelsea ward. The ballot box will be in the Little Shop until Saturday 5th August. Alternatively, residents can email the parish clerk at <u>icklesham@hotmail.co.uk</u> giving name and address and stating which option they support.


Cllr Smedley urged everyone to vote. He made it clear that names and addresses would need to be included to ensure votes were valid. Anonymous votes will not be counted. Counting will be done by the Clerk and, to ensure confidentiality, no one else will have access to the voting slips and emails.

The result will be announced by the Clerk on 11th August. If there is a clear majority for a single option, a formal proposal will be submitted to East Sussex County Council. ESCC will then publish a Traffic Regulation Order outlining the proposal in local media and request comments on it. Depending on the response, ESCC Planning Committee will then decide to approve or not. If approved, no scheme would be made permanent without a provisional trial and a review of how it was operating.

Even if the town voted to make no change, work would be bound to continue on other ways to reduce the danger from traffic speeding through the town.

Whatever the outcome of the current vote, consultation and action on measures to make it safer for people to cross the A259 both at the bottom of Stand Hill and opposite the New Hall would be essential.

# **Reflections from the Rectory**

Since the beginning of the year a group of around fourteen people have gathered in the New Inn on the first Thursday of each month for bible study. If that sounds rather too worthy, it probably has more in common with a book club meeting. We have looked at different passages and different writers from the Old Testament and reflected on what they might mean, their historical context and literary appeal. We will be taking a break during August but in July we looked at several of the Psalms.

The Psalms are a collection of writings which were probably written over a period of a thousand years. They are perhaps one of the more difficult biblical writings to date and scholarship has varied enormously over the years. What is perhaps most intriguing about the Psalms is that they have constantly remained in use to enhance worship since they were recorded; in some cases for 3000 years. They are still revered in Judaism and have become part of our Christian heritage too. We recite a psalm as part of the lectionary on our Sunday morning service and they are always incorporated into the orders for morning and evening prayer. Although they represent a huge variety of styles and approaches to God one of their most notable features is the way they engage with the challenges of the human condition; something better known hymns sometimes fail to do. They frequently acknowledge what is difficult about life, most famously in the Psalm that Jesus recalls as he is dying on the cross, "My God, My God why hast thou forsaken me?" Having stated and acknowledged what is hard about life, they often move towards a sense of hope and redemption.


The reason I have chosen to reflect on this is that I noticed that the Bible Society commissioned a special garden for the RHS flower show in Tatton Park this week. It was designed by Ollie Pike, who is only 24. His garden is based on Psalm 27 and it was inspired by the graveyards Ollie used to visit during lockdown, which he found to be calming and welcoming spaces where he could reconnect with nature.

Psalm 27 which begins 'The Lord is my light and my salvation', spoke to him of God's protection in the face of challenging circumstances, and of the eternal hope found in him. Stone markers and a tomb-like structure speak of our mortality, but there's also the sense of a journey through grief to hope. The planting evokes a meadow, with soft grasses and wildlife-friendly flowering plants.

There is a well-established biblical tradition based on reflecting on the natural world which makes the Psalms ideally suited to such interpretation. Psalm 27 is about facing one's fears and anxieties but then leading us into hope, "Wait for the Lord: Be strong, and let your heart take courage, wait for the Lord!

We all have moments of doubt and anxiety sometimes a beautiful garden can be a source of hope, sometimes a wonderfully crafted Psalm can uplift us – however we seek peace, "take courage, wait for the Lord!"

# High Summer in the Churchyard

*Shirley Meyer writes:* Last week I was digging out some ragwort from the flower circles when I realised how incredibly dry and hard the soil is. To be honest, I was surprised that the plants had managed to survive. Although we have had some rain, we have had a lot of sun and drying winds too.

The daisies did well and now the purple knapweed (don't be put off by the name) is flowering prolifically, attracting lots of insects, such as dragonflies, bees, butterflies and smaller hoverflies for example. *Daucas Carota* (wild carrot) is also strongly in evidence. It is an interesting flower as it has a small black dot in the middle which mimics the presence of a fly and, thus, attracts insects to the pollen. We are reaching that time of year when mowing the meadows has to be considered and planned. In 2022 we cut at the end of August and it is probable that we will do so again this year. With the annual churchyard working party suggested for Friday 8th September, 10am to 12.30pm, we thought some of you might like to join in the harvest raking when we cut the grass too. It is good fun and would be marvellous chance for some of us to get together as a community with a common cause. Refreshments will be provided. If you are interested, then please contact me on the email below. The date is not set in stone as we are weather dependent, but I would contact you as soon as a decision is made.

In the meantime, when you are crossing the churchyard, don't just pass by the circles. Stop, linger and look at the insects buzzing around and be reminded that their presence is the reason we started the project in the first place, in order to support the swift population. Their pollinating actions are a bonus.

Enjoy August and watch the skies for the departure of the swifts; I always miss them.

# From Winchelsea to Whitehall

*Natasha Robinson writes:* As a teenager, in a bid to make me read, my grandmother got me a Nancy Drew mystery. It worked and I read a couple more. Fearless, independent and always in the right, was Nancy, which is why she appealed to this south London kid.

Had I grown up down here, maybe she would have got me 'The Gay Dolphin Adventure' instead. After all, it's set in a hotel, run by the mother of one of the main characters and my parents ran a restaurant...

But I had to wait many years before I discovered Malcolm Saville; until I moved to Winchelsea and like most of you, walked past Chelsea Cottage, Castle Street. Ignorance is rarely bliss, it's just ignorance and certainly nothing to advertise. But being curious and willing to plug the gaps in your knowledge and constantly learn, are what the Second Wednesday Society is all about.

I'd seen his books at the Rye Harbour Discovery Centre, I'd featured the blue plaque on The Hope Anchor in Rye, on the Rye News Instagram page; but until I heard Elaine Luke's passionate talk, I had no idea who Malcolm Saville really was.

He published over sixty children's books and ninety in total. They were translated into nine languages, made into films and featured on *Children's Hour*. But somehow he never gained the fame of the person he replaced as editor of the magazine *Sunny Stories* in 1954, Enid Blyton.

He was far more of a descriptive writer, the local landscape becoming as much of a character in his books, as any of the protagonists. In fact he also wrote about nature, conservation, gardening, architecture and religion, as well as 'The Adventure Of The Life-Boat Service' and 'The Story of Winchelsea Church'.

Anyone in Literary Society with me, will remember that I love the James Bond novels. Written at the same time as Saville's stories, they are darker and more political than the films, as they come from the pen of an insider of this murky world. It almost goes without saying, that there is a link between both authors and that link is Winchelsea. Another former resident, Vera Atkins, is supposed to be the inspiration for Miss Moneypenny.

'The Shady Life of Ian Fleming' will be brought to light by our friend Hugh Willing, who we welcome back to the Second Wednesday Society on 13th September.

So enjoy August; keep dry, keep cool, keep warm or batten down the hatches. Whatever the weather, as residents of Winchelsea, your interest will be stirred, but nothing will get you shaken and circle the second Wednesday in September in your diaries.

#### Winchelsea Traffic Calming

The Parish Council held a public meeting at Winchelsea New Hall on Saturday 22nd July to vote on the remaining options for traffic calming in Winchelsea. There was a 20-minute presentation and then over an hour of discussion. The meeting was very well attended so thank you all for taking the time to attend and take part in this important matter.

Please remember, voting for the preferred option closes on 5th August. There is a voting box in the Little Shop where you can post your forms. Alternatively, you can email these to the Clerk at the email below. Please rest assured that all votes will remain confidential and please contact the Clerk if you have any questions. The results will be published on the Parish Council's website on Friday 11th August.

#### Website

The Parish Council met in Winchelsea Beach on 10th July and at this meeting IPC agreed to set up a new media working group to revamp the Parish Council's website (at present hosted by Rother District Council) to encourage better community engagement.

#### Allotments

The Council also agreed to officers collecting deposits equal to one year's rent for new tenancies for allotment plots - this is due to the number of allotments left unattended. We currently have a vacant plot at our Pear Tree Marsh site. If you would like to apply for this plot, please complete an application form (available on our website) or contact the Clerk.

#### Toilets

Although IPC have been in discussion with Rother District Council regarding acquiring the toilets in Winchelsea Beach and Winchelsea for some time it was agreed to officially start the process. This may take some time as this will be subject to satisfactory surveys and reports etc. so there is a lot of work to do before IPC are to become responsible as both buildings are currently in a state of disrepair. Meanwhile we have redecorated the public toilets in Rye Harbour, the donation box is being utilised which defrays the cost, and they look so much nicer for our residents and visitors to use.


# John Freeman MBE

John died on 25th July. Retired from the Army with the rank of major, John moved to Winchelsea with Anna in 2000. He became chairman of the Museum and of the New Hall Committee where he was much involved in the planning of the extension to the west end of the building.

John was made a freeman of the town and subsequently served as a jurat. He was a cellar tour guide for some years and wrote regular articles on historical topics for the magazine. John and Anna moved to Sevenoaks in 2019 but always regarded Winchelsea as home.

John's funeral will take place in St. Thomas' Church, most probably on Friday 11th August.

# Affordable Housing at Icklesham

The completion of fifteen new rural homes that are affordable for local people was celebrated on 14th July.

Prior to the houses being built, there were a total of 167 affordable homes in the Parish of Icklesham. The 15 new homes represent a 9% increase in social housing provision, making a significant difference to the lives of local people in the Parish. The homes at Orchard Close will remain affordable and for local people in perpetuity.

Speaking at the event, Geoff Foot, Chairman of Icklesham Parish Community Land Trust, said: "For many years Icklesham Parish Council has been concerned at the dearth of local affordable housing due to rising local house prices and the lack of affordable housing options. Younger families were having to leave the villages or were having to live in unsuitable accommodation.

"We received over 500 bids for the houses and a number of deserving applicants had to be turned down. Certainly, for me it brought home the scale of the problem with the lack of local affordable housing, both here and across the district." The Icklesham Parish Community Land Trust played a pivotal role in the development of the site working in partnership with Icklesham Parish Council and with the invaluable help of the Sussex Community Housing Hub without which the project would never have got off the ground. Other partners included Rother District Council, Hastoe Housing Association, ECE Architecture, Westridge Construction Limited and employer's agent McCreith Construction Consultants.

Fifteen homes have been developed at Orchard Close on the former agricultural land: twelve for social rent and three for shared ownership. All homes have been prioritised for people with a local connection to the Civil Parish of Icklesham, such as those working in the village, those with close family in the area, or those who have previously lived there but have been forced to move out because of a lack of affordable housing.

New tenants, Libby and George, said: "Where we lived before there were seven of us in a small 3-bedroom house and we were living on top of each other. Then me and my partner moved here and our son was born a few weeks later. It's made a massive difference to our lives, having our own home, having lots of space and a garden. I love it."

Another resident, Rowland Gardner, said: "I've lived in Icklesham previously for around 20 years. Sheila and me lived in a park home prior to our move here. We're delighted with our new home."

Before construction started, an archaeological survey was carried out and small pieces of broken Roman pottery were found along with the remains of a Roman Cremation Vessel. There was also an unusual find with evidence of a cremation burial inside a square-ditched enclosure – possibly that of a child. It is not known if the excavated deposits were selfcontained or are part of a larger settled area.

# **Community Land Trust**

July also saw the Annual General Meeting of the Community Land Trust. It was poorly attended. The Board was reelected with no-one coming forward wishing to join the Board. This is of concern as the interests of the Trust and the Parish will be best served by some younger people coming forward to take up the reins so that our hard-won experience can be passed on. We also need to ensure that the Trust remains active long term to protect the new housing and to ensure they continue to give priority to residents of the Parish.


The meeting noted that after the allocation process for the fifteen homes was completed, that some 35 qualifying households were left with their housing need unsatisfied. A motion that the Parish Council should be asked to fund a further Housing Needs Survey to provide an up-to-date estimate of housing need.

As Secretary to the Trust, I have already passed the request to the Parish Council and I anticipate it will be discussed at their September meeting.

If a scheme is shown to be justified the Trust will use the experience we gained to reduce the timeframe for delivering a development. Seven years from survey to delivery is too long in my view. Our key partners have indicated a willingness to take part in a further scheme. That will save time on the design process as selecting consultants takes time.

The existing Board is willing to start another project, but parishioners should appreciate that some of us may not be able to see it to fruition. Membership of the Trust is open to all residents of the Parish. It cost  $\pounds_1$  to join. with no annual fee. Please consider joining.

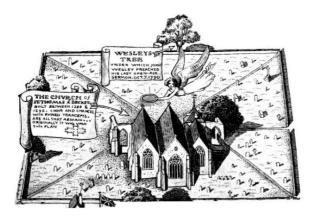
