# **Reflections from the Rectory**

We have been programmed to think that Advent starts at the beginning of December. Childhood Advent calendars would start on that date and the excitement of opening each window continued throughout the month until Christmas Eve, when the last window traditionally revealed an image of the crib with the Christ child and Mary and Joseph. Advent Sunday this year falls on the 3rd of December. The last Sunday of Advent happens to be Christmas Eve, although if Christmas Day falls on a Saturday, the last Sunday of Advent would be the 19th of December and Advent would begin on 28th November. It is by no means a fixed period.

Whatever the date of Advent we tend to start to think of Christmas from the beginning of December and in many cases well before that. Certainly schools will be beginning to have Christmas events and services. There are Christmas fairs designed to sell Christmas presents, Carol Services start to appear from the beginning of the month and often by the time we get to Christmas we are exhausted by the season of parties and celebrations.

In fact in the life of the church, Advent is a time of reflection. The liturgical colour is blue or purple, which is used as a symbol of penitence. It is also used during Lent when we prepare for the other great Christian celebration, the resurrection of our Lord. It is the colour used for a funeral

service too. While Lent is a time of personal reflection, Advent is sometimes seen as a time of reflection for the community as a whole. Although not many people are aware of it, Advent is a time when we reflect upon the promised second coming of Jesus. In that sense it is a time to consider how our community, society as a whole, the nation and the world are ready to accept a rule of peace and harmony. Are we prepared for such a wonder?

Many of you will think that such a vision is a is a hopelessly idealistic and, dare I say, a mythological conception. But however we think of it, surely it is not out of the question to imagine and pray for a world where things are in harmony, where our relationship with one another and with God is in balance. As the Psalmist so often calls us to do we are charged to "wait upon the Lord."

However appropriate it might seem in a religious or liturgical sense to maintain a spirit of complete abstinence during Advent, it is not really practical to do so in the modern world. As a church we have to embrace society around us and it is a great thrill to share and participate in the preparations for the birth of Christ.

However, as we enter Advent, I call upon all of us to give some time to reflect on the world. There will be three sessions of Evening Prayer for Advent in the side chapel on Wednesday 6th, 13th and 20th December at 5.30pm. They will last no more than 30 minutes and all are welcome.

# St Michael's Hospice Lights of Love


There will be a Lights of Love celebration at St Thomas's on Sunday 3rd December at 3.15pm, one of several that will take place in the local area on 3rd and 10th.

This talk will try and explain all the intricate detail on both sides of the seal and finally will come up with an unexpected potential site for a tower, perhaps linked with Old Winchelsea.

Natasha Robinson writes: If an Austrian woman named Klara, who had already buried five children, hadn't eventually been able to raise a son, Adolf, would I be here today? If a young half British, half American newspaper correspondent named Winston, hadn't narrowly avoided the bullet that killed his horse while on assignment in Cuba, I'd

probably be writing this in German. And if his distant cousin, Diana hadn't decided, on the spur of the moment, to go to Paris for the weekend... You get my drift; the paths, decisions and twists of fate that lead us in one direction, as opposed to another and the consequences of those actions, not just for ourselves, but for the world, these are the sliding doors of history.

Our November Speaker, Chris Viner, returned to Winchelsea to share his vast knowledge of Napoleon Bonaparte with us. Chris is a renowned expert on the Napoleonic era and this particular talk focused on Napoleon and the Jews.

Whatever your personal views of the Emperor and this is mainly dictated by which side of a narrow strip of channel you were born on, he was a visionary leader, whose radically different ideas shaped modern Europe. Eighteenth century France abolished the feudal system, had a centralised government and banking system, modern roads and sewage systems, medical schools and a legal system, the foundation of which is still in use today in many countries.

His attitude to the Jews singled him out amongst many world leaders, past and present. As a believer of total freedom of religion, not only did he allow open worship, but made Judaism the third official religion of the Empire. The single most extraordinary thing that we learned, was that as early as 1798, he was thinking of creating a State of Israel in Palestine. This document was even taken to the United Nations by David Ben-Gurion, along with a map drawn up by my grandfather Theodore Zissu, in 1947.

And then in 1815, the sliding doors of history, led him, us, the Jews, Israel and the world, down another path, which continues to dominate the international agenda to this day...

With a screeching gear change, December is AGM month for the Second Wednesday Society, traditionally washed down with Mulled Wine. This will be followed by Delia Taylor's happy, nostalgic, emersive, fun talk, 'The Sixties - Decade of Change' and our Christmas Tea. So bring your memories, your recollections, your friends and neighbours and let's end 2023 on a happy high...no 60s pun intended! ### **News from the New Hall**

'Keep Carmen and Carry On' at the New Hall on Saturday 26th November (Italian Evening courtesy of the Mayor and Mayoress), rounded off an outstanding month for the New Hall committee.

We have secured over £9,800 in grants towards the Ladies toilet refurbishment to compliment the generous funding raised in our community. Shortly, new windows will be arriving and the existing interior will be stripped out in February so that the renewed facility will be ready for late spring. Thanks for your continuing support, and thanks to the Little Cheyne Court Windfarm (£5,000), Rother Community Fund (£3,802) and The Rye Fund (£1,000) in this autumn's grant round.

Earlier in the month, on Saturday 11th November, we held our annual Christmas Fair. A massive thankyou to everyone who attended and supported the event by starting their Christmas shopping early and yet again we raised a substantial amount - £3,074 after costs - for the New Hall and for the Rye Food Bank. This will significantly help the New Hall towards the upgrading of the ladies and men's toilets (together with our grants)

The Grand Raffle and Tombola together raised an impressive £1,895. We are so grateful to all those who donated raffle and tombola prizes including Rye Harbour Nature Reserve,

Rye Chocolates, Rye Retreat and The Little Shop (and many many more). And of course, a big thank you to everyone who supported us by buying tickets. Well done to Saskia O'Donohue who won our top raffle prize of the spring tour of the Rye Nature Reserve for twelve people.

A further thank you needs to go to the wonderful array of different stall holders who make the event such a success, many were new participants in 2023. Before the Mayor drew the Grand Raffle, Hilary Roome was presented with a bouquet of flowers and thanked for her amazing organisation of the event over the last four years. Next year she will be standing down from overseeing the whole fair. She will be a tough act to follow. We are very grateful that Hilary will however continue to book the stallholders next year.

# Traffic and pavements

Extracts from the latest Winchelsea Residents Association report to members:

Thank you to everyone who gave comments on possible next steps on traffic calming. While the numbers were modest, 37 individuals/households, their feedback was positive and helpful. The majority want us to continue looking for a solution to the traffic problem. Views were split between pursuing Strand Hill closure and investigating new options.

Whilst we retain all our information on road closure, the committee has agreed to re-establish the traffic working group to research alternative options that may offer a suitable compromise.

Several responses raised possible examples including chicanes, 20mph zones and the use of APNR cameras. Some, but not all, have been researched previously and found to be unacceptable to ESCC and National Highways, and/or unaffordable and with limited impact. We know also that any local measure will have to be self-enforcing.


The main recent development has been in the receipt of a response from the Department for Transport to the letter which Sally-Ann Hart MP wrote at the group's request to the Minister for Roads putting the case for improvements to the


A259, especially at Tanyard Lane, Ferry Hill/Pipewell Gate, Rectory Lane and Crutches Farm. This long-awaited response is complicated by the new national Road Investment Strategy for 2025-30 being currently still in draft but it disappointingly provides no commitment to carry out the necessary improvement works.

The minister does mention that our section of the A259 has been chosen as part of an "Integrated Network Solutions Assessment" but what that will mean for our concerns, if anything, is not yet clear. The letter also states that, in recognition of the problem of speeding along Rectory Lane, Sussex Police will be carrying out a speed review in the area in the near future.

On 11th October we had confirmation from East Sussex Highways that the budget for our nine requested dropped kerbs has been approved and the contractors should start soon. We are one of twelve projects in East Sussex being completed between November and February 2024. The new dropped kerbs will make getting to the New Hall, the pub, the shop and the church much more accessible for everyone.


# **Garden Society**

# Ann Rachlin 1933-2023

Ann died on 20th November at the Icklesham home she shared with Iain Kerr. She was the remarkable mastermind behind last year's *Ukraine Reborn* concert at St Thomas's, calling on her wide contacts in the worlds of music and theatre to create an amazing event that raised £20,000 for the Saint Nicholas Hospital for Children in Lviv.

In a long and always active life, Ann was the subject of an episode of *This Is Your Life* and was awarded an MBE for her services to music and the welfare of deaf children. A compelling story-teller, she combined classical music with stories for children, establishing *Fun With Music* in 1965. Among the many young people entranced by those classes were Princes William and Harry.

Ann founded the Beethoven Fund for Deaf Children and was an authority on Ellen Terry and her daughter Edith Craig. Her collection of Terry memorabilia included the reminiscences of Edith Craig, which Ann published in her book *Edy was a Lady* in 2011. A member of the West London Synagogue, Ann marked her second Bat Mitzvah in 2018 and friends from Winchelsea celebrated with her.

Our hearts go out to Trisha and Max, and to Iain. Ann wonderfully enhanced the lives of all who knew her.
