Reflections from the Rectory

It is customary for clergy to take a week off after Easter and Christmas. It is not always possible to fit in a break but this year we were lucky enough to spend a few days with each of our daughters and visit West Wales where we went to the National Botanic Gardens of Wales and the delightful Aberglasney Gardens nearby.

Although the break was possible this year the weather did not exactly shine upon us but we were lucky to dodge the showers and enjoy our break including a sunshine visit to Laugharne, where Dylan Thomas lived and wrote and now lies in the churchyard.

During our week off we noticed the hedgerows and the trees just beginning to burst into life and when we came home there was blossom on the weeping pear; the garden and all around were transformed. It is always a joy at this time of year to witness the coming of the spring and the arrival of the swifts in Winchelsea.

There is much for which to be thankful. But glancing at the Psalm recently, I noticed the lines,

"O that we might see better times", Lift up the light of your countenance upon us, O Lord.

The wider world certainly seems troubled. Perhaps because of this we are all the more moved by the turning of the seasons. Maybe we gain some security from the things and the beauty we cannot control. I planted my potatoes a few weeks ago and sowed carrots and beetroot, the rest I leave to nature.

The psalm reminds us not to run after false gods. Sometimes we are so caught up in the concerns and worries of life that we fail to appreciate properly what is around us. I do not to say that there are simple answers and that all the world's problems can be solved by the burgeoning blossom. But in the small way if we are moved by the beauty of this place and the good fortune to live around here maybe we can do a little to make the world a better place.

The pattern of the ancient poetry of the Hebrews is often to cry out to God acknowledging the struggles of life and then to lead to an acceptance of the presence of the Lord; and so ends the psalm. Let this thought sustain us during this Easter season.

You have put gladness in my heart, more than when grain and wine and oil increase. I lie down in peace; at once I fall asleep; for only you, Lord, make me dwell in safety.

Rogation Walk

It was an ancient mediaeval tradition to beat the bounds of the parish on Rogation Sunday. Rogation is primarily about prayer and in particular about praying for a good harvest and blessing the land and livestock. It was also seen as a time to drive evil spirits from the parish. There were often disturbances as rival parishioners confronted one another trying to drive evil forces into their neighbouring parish.



The Fount of all Knowledge

Winchelsea Arts 9th Season

Winchelsea Arts unveiled a ninth season of concerts at a launch event at the end of April. <u>You will find the full 2024-25 programme here</u>

The season sees the return of past favourites and welcomes some stars with an international reputation, like pianist Pascal Rogé (above) and the London Handel Players. The London Handel Players' concert, which opens the season in July, has been made possible by the generous sponsorship of Heringtons Solicitors.

A Christmas concert by Candlelight is becoming a tradition, and this year it has a French theme.

Season tickets and tickets for individual concerts are available to buy at <u>winchelsea-arts.org.uk</u>. Season ticket prices stay the same as last year - £88 (or £165 for a joint subscription). This works out at six concerts for the price of less than four. Tickets for individual concerts will cost £24 and under 18s are admitted free.

But before the new season kicks off, there is one more concert in the current series. On Saturday 18th May, Hastings Philharmonic Orchestra return to play Mozart's *Serenade No.10* and Dvořák's *Serenade for Wind Instruments*. Tickets for this are on sale online for £22. Judging by previous audiences for the HPO there won't be many tickets left to sell at the door - if any.

Little Gate Farm

On 25th April a small group of residents from Winchelsea and Pett visited Little Gate Farm at Beckley to see the marvellous work they do with young people.

In 2013 Claire and David Cordell founded Little Gate, with the idea of increasing the opportunities available to adults with learning disabilities and autism. They used part of the farm to create the learning and training centre knowing that with the right support, people with learning disabilities and autism can be happy and valued employees in any industry.

Supported Employment is the process of helping someone find work, learn the job to a high standard and ensuring their continued success in that role. The Supported Employment model has been successfully used for decades, creating a partnership between businesses and the supported employees with long term benefits for both parties. There is an amazing team of staff and volunteers, some of whom showed us around and answered our questions.

Growing and producing cut flowers is one of their main projects and we saw the wonderful raised beds, both outside and in a polytunnel, where plants were at various stages of growth. There was a large emphasis on potting on and planting out at present. The young people grow specific varieties, as requested by local professional florists, and harvest them to specific instructions. They will be starting to sell at the Brede Farmers Market in a few weeks and also Hastings Station.

Surrounded by many acres of ancient woodland, which needs careful management, they also produce lumpwood charcoal, which is bagged up on site and sealed with their signature wooden clip. It can be bought locally at Salt's Farm, East Guldeford and is really excellent...we have been using it for years. There is also a cafe, where everything is cooked onsite and a large barn which is hired out as a venue.

There is so much to say, I could go on forever but why not go and see for yourselves. They are having a Festival Open Day on Saturday 8th June. There'll be food, flowers, animals, etc.

Annual Parish Meeting

There can be, and often is, confusion between the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Council Meeting. All Towns

and Civil Parishes throughout England are required by law to hold an Annual Parish Meeting, which must take place between 1st March and the 1st June (inclusive). This technically is not a Council meeting but it is normally the Parish Council who organise this meeting each year. The purpose of the meeting is to give the Parish Council, and other local organisations an opportunity to let local residents know what they have been doing over the past year. The meeting is also an opportunity for electors to have a say on anything they consider valuable to the people of the Parish.

The meeting can also be an opportunity for local groups, clubs, societies and other voluntary and statutory organisations to provide an exhibition and/or have representatives from the group address those present at the meeting about the work they do and what they are involved in. This year the Annual Parish Meeting has been organised for Friday 31st May at 7pm in Icklesham Memorial Hall.

We have organised presentations from:-

1. Rother District Council to come and give a presentation on the new Local Plan, which is open for public consultation from 12th April. They will also be able to answer questions residents may have on the new Local Plan.

2. Representatives from Winchelsea Museum

We are also relaunching our community awards scheme which is where the Council present awards to residents and organisations who go above and beyond for the local community. Those who have been selected for an award will be contacted prior to the meeting.

There will also be light refreshments at the end of the meeting. We really hope to see lots of residents attending this year as it will be a very interesting meeting. The Parish Council will be providing transport to and from Rye Harbour, Winchelsea Beach and Winchelsea. If you would like to book a seat, please contact the Clerk.

Review of Traffic Calming Proposals

The Winchelsea Residents Association Members' Meeting on 27th April discussed, amongst other issues, the outcome of the review the Committee has done on the prospects for an alternative traffic calming scheme for the town. This short written report sets out the Committee's conclusions on the review.

Summary: Until more positive policies are adopted and able to be funded by the County Council we do not think that an alternative major scheme to calm traffic passing through central Winchelsea is a realistic prospect, not least because it would require residents to raise very substantial funds. However, we think that there are some things we can press the county council to consider, with potential for some impact on the worst of the speeding and aggressive driving.

Following the loss of the options to restrict or close Strand Hill the WRA Committee has researched what could now be done. Our conclusion from this review is that it is not realistic at this point to pursue options for an alternative major scheme of the kind which the council have indicated that they might approve - such as for a 20mph limit supported by chicanes.

Currently, the council would consider funding only up to 50% of the costs of the design, management and implementation of such a project, with residents needing to fund all remaining costs. Total costs could be in the region of £150,000. or even more.

We hope that the council will, at a later stage, be able to adopt more positive policies for traffic calming across Winchelsea, and be able to find more resources to deliver these. In the meantime can continue discussing with the council the potential for introducing smaller, more innovative and realistically affordable measures to have some impact on the reduction of speeding and aggressive driving.

In addition, we think that there are several parts of the streets in the town which are inadequate and dangerous and for which the county council, as the highways authority, should take action to improve with funding from their own capital programme, irrespective of a policy to secure traffic calming. These locations are especially at the bottom of Strand Hill (pedestrian crossing point); at the Strand Gate; at the New Inn corner; and at the school access point at the end of Monks Walk.

The Winchelsea 2025 Book

During early May, 'street champions' will be calling on Winchelsea neighbours to deliver the questionnaires that will form the basis of 'Winchelsea 2025', the successor to the Millennium Book which gave such an evocative snapshot of the town in 2000. That book also was also based on questionnaires sent to everyone, so the new project has good antecedents.

The working group very much hope that you will want to be included. The area covered will be the electoral ward of Winchelsea, from the railway station to the Sea Road junction, and on the top of the hill.

While the questionnaires are out, Jonathan Murphy will be taking street and house photos and, later, he'll take pictures of individual households to set against the text. As the questionnaires come back, David Page will lead a small team who will edit the text so that everything fits together.

Jennifer Sutherland and Gillian Alexander have been interviewing long-term residents of the town whose memories and reflections will form an important part of the book. The school, shop, pub and fish and chip van will not be forgotten.

Winchelsea organisations, clubs and societies have been invited to send in information about themselves which Bill Doherty will meld together to give a comprehensive view of the activity of the town. If your group hasn't responded to this invitation yet, please don't forget. Dominic Leahy and Melvyn Pett provided an introduction to the 2000 version, and David Merrifield will write the equivalent for 2025.

With a following wind, this should all be ready in time for us to take orders for the completed book by the end of this year. It will make an excellent Christmas present. Publishing and colour printing have come on by leaps and bounds since the millennium. This will be a classy hardback production we're sure you won't be able to resist.

Grids get Royal Approval

Three years ago the King - then Prince of Wales - came on an informal visit to Winchelsea. His team were drawing up plans for a new housing development on Duchy of Cornwall land in Faversham. This is part of a larger area released for housing on the south side of the town, bounded by the M2.

The Duchy team were proposing a plan with streets laid out on a grid pattern and they wanted to persuade the prince that this was a good idea. So they brought him to Winchelsea in May 2021 to see the town laid out on a grid pattern by his distant forbear, Edward I.

Clearly he was persuaded, and the new Faversham development of 2,500 homes will indeed be built on a grid. In our case the grid centres on the churchyard, in Faversham's case, on a cricket field.

Small jewels of Winchelsea

While walking round the Rectory Garden recently, looking at the large amount of work to be done before opening for the NGS in June, I was reminded of a visitor last year. He was a very knowledgeable botanist who was entranced by the ferns in the walls of the town. Apparently, Winchelsea is one of the best sites for *Asplenium ceterach* (above) in the south east, along with about a dozen other varieties found in the gardens of *King's Leap* and *Rye View*.

I am lucky enough to have this little jewel in several walls at the Rectory along with *Polypodium cambricum* which is more common. One look at the website of the British Pteridological Society shows just the amazing variety to seek out. So keep your eyes peeled for different varieties and see if you can add to the database. <u>epbs.org.uk</u>


Aspects of Travel

A Triumph of Style and Substance

Undeterred by the unseasonal April chill dealt them by *the cruellest month*, the *hooded hordes* of the Lit. Soc. swarmed over their own evening shadows, newly risen to meet them, and packed out the sanctuary of the Court Hall in anticipation of the literary beatitude *Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after the classic modernist poem; for they shall be filled*.

And the Society's speaker, Gawain Douglas, did not disappoint, delivering a forceful but sensitive rendering of T. S. Eliot's *The Waste Land* in conjunction with some illuminating interpretation.

In a preliminary exploration of the poet's background, Gawain climbed purposefully into the ring of contested *Eliotica* in asserting his belief that Eliot was gay and had had an affair with the French medic, Jean Jules Verdenal, who died at Gallipoli in 1915, in *the cruellest month*.

Eliot's first volume of poetry, which included *The Love Song* of *J. Alfred Prufrock*, was dedicated to Verdenal and a quotation from Dante's *Purgatorio* supplemented the epigraph in later editions describing the warmth of the American's love and how even Verdenal's shade seemed a solid thing. Douglas believes Verdenal was the *hyacinth girl* who features in the first section of *The Waste Land*.

In reciting the poem itself, the product of ruthless editing by Eliot's friend Ezra Pound, our speaker rose to the challenge of the material's structure. Set in five individually headed parts, it offers a verbal montage needing a polyphonic commentary which taxes the skills of the lone narrator.

The piece is replete with quotation and allusion requiring some editions to publish explanatory postscripts exceeding the length of the original stanzas and Gawain's linguistic versatility came to the fore as he moved through Dante's Italian, Baudelaire's French and a Wagner libretto in German before swinging into a Cockney register to reproduce the strident voices of intoxicated females being shepherded from the pub across from Eliot's Crawford Mansions flat at closing time by a tolerant but persistent landlord. The ladies were locked in animated discussion on the respective merits of dentures and natural dentition and the troublesome side effects of some illicit abortifacient potions.

Religion was not neglected in the poem's broad cultural sweep and Tiresias surfaced from Greek mythology as a warning against annoying the Gods. This unfortunate, the paradoxical *blind seer*, suffered a divinely ordained, involuntary seven-year sex change and physical blinding although he was partly compensated with the gift of prophecy, second sight; this experience made him an expert opinion in gender disputes.

Another section is inspired by the foundational Buddhist *Fire Sermon* and twice we hear the opening sentence from St. Augustine's *Confessions* where he arrives in Carthage to find *a cauldron of unholy loves* singing about his ears. Although we can drill down on particular phrases to elicit meaning, some minds are still tormented by echoes of Cilla Black's insistent enquiry – *What's it all about, Alfie?*

We never did hear Alfie's answer but the current consensus seems to be that *The Waste Land* exceeds the sum of its parts and while agreement on a unifying theme remains elusive, we are advised to let the waves of verse break over us and savour the bits that appeal.




Archaeological Society Walk

Andrew Scott will lead a walk to the south side of the town on Saturday 18th May.

Note that the Meeting Point is on the east side of Castle Street before the Town Well is reached and nearer the High Street. The walk will depart at 11.15am.

Our last visit in 2022 to this area near the New Gate looked mainly at the Gate and its surroundings. This time we are primarily interested in the three hospitals - St John's, St Bartholomew's and Holy Cross. The sites of the last two were not reliably known, but magnetometry data taken in 2023 by the Hastings And Area Research Group (HAARG) indicate a potential site above Pewes Marsh. North is to the top. Could this be the Hospital of the Holy Cross?

D-Day 80th Anniversary Reception and Beacon Lighting


This year's Beacon lighting reception on 6th June will be hosted by Winchelsea Millennium Artefacts Society in association with Winchelsea Corporation to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings.

A series of storyboards and portfolios will be presented to give a brief account of the background to D-Day. The content will consist of text, maps, photographs and documents, many of which have not been seen since the war and were obtained from private sources as well as from the Winchelsea Corporation via East Sussex Record Office.

They will provide an insight into the activities of some of the military units that were stationed in the town, where they were billeted, and the contribution they made to our safety.

There will be background on 'Winchelsea at War', including the visit of Generals Montgomery and Eisenhower who stayed for a brief time in *Greyfriars*. It will record the residents who bravely gave their lives in the conflict, the houses that were bombed, the families that remained.

They will also tell of the remarkable contribution made by three of our town's residents. Their brief biographies have been compiled by Jerry Moss who will include a more detailed account of Operation Overlord. We hope as many of you as are able will come to the Beacon lighting to commemorate this historic occasion.

attend. The Chairman and Treasurer will provide their annual reports and officers will be elected.






