

Millennium Artefacts Society mounted another very successful exhibition over the Bank Holiday weekend under the careful supervision of Geraldine I'Anson who received enthusiastic thanks at the launch reception.





Geraldine writes: The lack of our summer sunshine was not reflected in this year's artist exhibits which the many visitors to this exhibition felt were full of life, colour, interest and variety, successfully giving us a 25% increase in sales.

We received enquiries for commissions from four artists whose work had been sold together with requests for prints of two photographers' work.

This year we added eight new visitor artists from further afield who together outnumbered the regular group of Winchelsea artist who support our fund raising efforts each year. We had five talented artists from St Thomas's School whose work was exceptional for children aged from five years to ten years old. All the exhibits, from mixed media collage, charcoal, pastel and oil were sold to very proud parents.

The chairman and the committee would like to thank all the artists for submitting their paintings, photography, and pottery which was a wonderful eclectic mix and this year included some sculpture. Our horizons are broadening so scope for further creativity. Our thanks also go the donors of the very generous raffle prizes. There were twelve in all, which raised over £700.

This year has been a busy year for the Millennium Artefacts Society which began with the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landing. We start next year with a Beacon lighting once again in May to celebrate V E Day.

He was also a skilled draughtsman, with a gentle, colloquial sense of humour. He teased his audience with benevolence and wit, not politics or admonition. And remember, he started in the sixties, a time of huge cultural and doctrinal change, both nationally and globally.

Religion, like humour, is a deeply personal thing, but satirised with skill or sensitivity, one can get on just fine with the other. Laughter is often the way in to a complex subject matter or situation. If I say: "Dave Allen" at this point, you'll know what I mean. More latterly, one of my favourite lines in a TV series is when the archdeacon in 'Rev.' turns to Tom Hollander's character, Reverend Adam, and says: "Make this quick, I have a reservation at The Ivy at 1.00"...

So join us to discover an entirely different side to someone you thought you already knew. Back in the New Hall, back with friends and neighbours, back for tea and back for another enlightening talk. *Natasha Robinson*

Reflections from the Rectory

August draws to a close. The final Garden Society show of the year has taken place. The allotments are still full of growth but the first hints of autumn are in the air. The curling dry and whitened leaves of the sweet peas, the leafy courgette plants begin to shrivel. The cabbage white butterflies and caterpillars have been very busy on our kale. The sunflowers start to dip and shed their seeds. The crab apples lie heavy on the tree by the allotment gate in beautiful hues of red and yellow and orange.

When roasted crabs hiss in the bowl, Then nightly sings the staring owl: 'Tu-who; Tu-whit, To-who' a merry note.

The 'roasted crabs' in the beautiful epilogue to Shakespeare's, *Love's Labour's Lost* are crab apples, not as I thought for a long time the marine variety. The epilogue speaks of the winter. We still have autumn to come and yet the chill in the evening signals the turning of the year. I have heard the tawny owls calling just as Shakespeare did.

I have always found this a beautiful time of year especially for the September sun which although less intense somehow seems to warm beneath the skin as if recharging our hearts for the coming winter. The cycle of the seasons is reflected in church life and after a long period of ordinary time the festivals start to stack up: Harvest and All Saints, All Souls when we commemorate those we have lost, Remembrance and Advent when the darkness of the evenings envelops us.

The winter is some way off but the early days of autumn herald the shortening days. Our musical director in Kintbury, where I started my ministry and Shirley sang in the choir, taught us a lovely Iona Community song, "Thank you for the Night". It reminds us that without the contrast of seasons, without the night and day, the light and the dark we would pass over something of the wonder of our lives and very being.

Those times of darkness and loss highlight the times of joy and thanksgiving, without them we would have nothing for which to give thanks, it is part the richness of being.

It is perhaps why I love this season when the leaves begin to fall, the mists to rise and fruit to drop. We turn to ourselves, to the hope that as the year turns we will be reborn. The rebirth that is the gift of a risen Lord. That rebirth comes to us in the shortened days, let us give thanks for the night as we give thanks for the coming of autumn and winter.

Thank you for the night, A measure of your care. In darkness, as in light, You, Lord, are there.

Winchelsea Archaeological Society


On Wednesday 11th September at the New Hall starting at 6pm, WAS is pleased to host a presentation and discussion led by Dr Andrew Richardson from Isle Heritage CIC. WAS members will remember the excellent talk he gave to the Society in April this year on the Lossenham Project in Newenden.

This replaces a WAS meeting originally planned for Saturday 21st September.

This meeting is about archaeology on National Trust land in Winchelsea. After carrying out geophysical surveying during August, he will present the collated geophysics results and explain his plan for a programme of investigative community fieldwork. The aim is to gather a cohort of willing volunteers for fieldwork (including excavation) likely to commence in October.

He will also provide an update on the National Trust Winchelsea Landscape Revival (WLR) Project.

Collecting the King's Dues

Town Chamberlain, Neil Clephane-Cameron will be carrying out his time-honoured annual duty of collecting the King's Dues at the end of this month.

When Queen Elizabeth I visited Winchelsea in the late sixteenth century she was apparently horrified by the state of the town. By then it was in serious decline due to the silting up of the harbour and the loss of its function as a port.

Accordingly, the Queen passed to the Corporation the town gates, along with the revenue from their use, as well as the right to charge ground rent on certain land and properties in the town, known now as the King's Dues. Today these are collected on a totally voluntary basis and the Corporation benefits by about \pounds_{30} per annum.



Restoration at the Court Hall


On Wednesday 28th August, Winchelsea Corporation signed a contract with the specialist stonemasonry company, Traditional Stone, who are to carry out repairs to the west elevation of the Court Hall and the chimney stack. It has taken us eighteen months to get to this point, which may seem a long time, but as many of us know, carrying out maintenance work on old buildings is never straightforward.

Considering its age the building is in remarkably good condition, but like any building it does need regular maintenance. To help us identify and prioritise the work required, the Corporation commissioned the Thomas Ford Partnership, an architect's practice that specialises in the restoration of ancient buildings. They surveyed the entire building and identified that repairs to the stonework on the west elevation and chimney should be prioritised.

As a grade-one listed building, the Corporation needed to work closely with the Conservation Officer at Rother and other stakeholders. Once those necessary permissions were obtained, four companies were invited to tender, and Traditional Stone, who are based in West Sussex, were eventually chosen.

Work should begin early in September, with the cost being split between the Corporation and FOAM. If you would like to find out more about the history of the building, the work that we are planning now - and in the future, why don't you pop into the Lower Court Hall on either Saturday 14th September or Sunday 15th between 11.30am and 3.30pm. Members of the Corporation will be there to answer any questions, and there will be information boards and copies of the various architects reports available for you to examine.

FOAM keep busy

August has been a brilliant month for FOAM. It began with the legendary FOAM bottle stall at the Winchelsea Fete. Over 90 bottles of wine were donated by members and supporters in the town. The stall did brisk business all afternoon and eventually raised an incredible £1,000 topped up by a couple of generous donations.

That money will be put to good use, which brings us to our second piece of good news. On 28th August, contracts were signed for repairs to the Court Hall's west elevation and chimney. FOAM is contributing half of the costs. The next project for the Court Hall will be repairs to the doorway on the ground floor and surrounding stonework. FOAM has agreed to pay for an architect's report and detailed specification; this is required for listed building consent and to obtain tenders. Finally, FOAM have also agreed to cover the cost of removing weeds on top of all three medieval gates.

The Fall of the House of Usher

Cutting the Wildflower Circles

By the time you read this we will have cut down the wildflowers in the churchyard and removed all the vegetation so that, going forward into winter, the ground can be prepared for next year.

Our team worked hard but Jim Kay had been up in the early morning and scythed two meadows, leaving neat piles of clippings.

We raked and bundled moving the vegetation into bags and bins. I must thank all those people from the local community who generously lent their brown bins to aid removal of rubbish but we did not need them as Birdie had offered to remove the greater part of it to the tip. Thank you Birdie.

It can take a few years for a newly planted meadow to settle and find a balance, but careful management is also vital to that. Once the vegetation is cut and removed, the ground is mowed and scarified to allow for new seeds to be sown and be in close contact with the earth. The plan is to add more spring bulbs for example native daffodils (narcissus pseudonarcissus), grape hyacinths, more alliums and crocus and choose a good wildflower seed mix for each circle.

The yellow rattle has weakened the grasses substantially and it is unlikely that we will sow anymore at the moment. Wildflower seeds should do well but, as with all such matters, the weather next year will be very important. We saw small voles and mice living in the meadows, as well as abundant insect life.

Also, I am really delighted to have been asked to visit the wildflower areas made by some Winchelsea residents (they know who they are) in their own gardens this year. What a treat! It is also great to know that the message about the value of biodiversity is reaching people and they are making a personal effort to make a small contribution.

The Western Slopes and access for all

Winchelsea Conservation Society committee have had our second meeting with the Dover NT office staff and are pleased that this channel of communication is proving valuable for all concerned.

It is not that long ago that some residents were told to get off one of the footpaths on the western slopes, and because of this we became concerned as to what access the public was actually to be allowed.

There followed a great deal of research by members of our committee identifying Freeman's Will, and the terms under which the estate was gifted to the NT in lieu of death duties. June Grindley, a committee member, also found this very telling reference in Hansard that reads – '...the land was to be used for Public enjoyment'. In addition, if this land was not needed for a by-pass it would become 'inalienable'.

Of more recent concern was the arrival of twenty-plus padlocks on 33 mostly brand-new gates on NT land. Bearing in mind the NT aims to put livestock on the land that they are rewilding, we are aware of the safety issues that cattle may pose. However, we have begun discussions on the need for all of these gates to be locked and the necessity of having so much metal fencing as opposed to hedging.

Above all our research has established that the many unregistered footpaths across the western slopes have been used for centuries. They are historic and the NT, we believe, are understanding and open to the idea that the public can use them. This was the aim of the gift of this land to the NT in the first place.

We also continue to discuss open access to the western slopes and a number of other issues that are relevant to us all. These include access to the Beacon for national events, a problem that has only recently emerged.

We also look forward meeting planned for Wednesday 23rd October involving all residents from the town and the NT which we are delighted to note will include a plenary session.

Village Fetes



Welcome to our September update. We have been working hard to establish new communications and keep on top of current local issues. We have increased our membership and added local experience and skills to our committee. Thank you for continuing to support us and we hope you find the update helpful.

Communications

New Committee members

Following changes to the Committee in March when some long standing members stood down, we have recruited three new members, Julie Gurr, Ian Menzies and David Richards. Traffic

Improving road safety continues to be a priority for WRA. We are in regular contact with Rother DC and understand yet another survey is needed because of the extent of disrepair. Only after the survey can a decision be made on whether the building can be repaired and who will be responsible for its future maintenance. In the meantime, it remains open.

Dropped kerbs





Pett Level Rescue Boat

We finally welcomed some summer warmth and sunshine and saw our beaches fuller with visitors. We had a very busy few weeks, with multiple taskings and community events.. read on for our news.

After a relatively quiet start to the summer, the end of July and August saw a real spike in shouts. On one day we were tasked three times to incidents at Camber – in addition to being called upon for first aid assistance. At this time of year, our taskings are often to search for missing people on busy beaches – which involve multiple units and cross-agency collaboration.

One search took place late in the evening and 10 miles off Hastings. In pitch black and very choppy waters, this was a challenging situation for our crew who were out for over three hours. We train to be prepared, confident and competent, but these taskings are hard and we thank our amazing team for being so dedicated to our ultimate mission to preserve lives at sea.


