



This year David has achieved something quite remarkable, namely the publishing of his father's memoirs with his own historical research providing context and background.

For Rob and me, it has made both of us wonder again what we could and should do with our own fathers' memoirs and indeed about writing down our own, just informally for our children. As well as enjoying David's presentation of his father's youthful experience in the Merchant Navy, you may well find yourself thinking about the potential legacies of your own family histories.


As usual we will be providing a delicious hot meal, (lasagne this year) and tempting your willpower with lovely puddings.

This month Winchelsea Literary Society welcomes David Page who will be giving a talk entitled, *Emile Zola:* Dissecting the French Second Empire

In his lifetime, Emile Zola's novels were enjoyed and denounced in almost equal measure. In a series of twenty books he followed the fortunes of one extended family as its members navigated success and failure in the dynamic but flawed France of Emperor Napoleon III. Later, Zola hit the headlines all over Europe for his impassioned defence of Alfred Dreyfus - 'J'accuse!' In this talk, David tells the dramatic story of Zola's life and introduces us to some of the novels in his famous sequence.

Angela Hill: With Great Pleasure

Admiration for a popular member rather than hedonism saw the Lit. Soc. defy adverse auguries on Friday 13th to hear Angela Hill's selection, distilled from a lifetime's literary enthusiasms. Assiduous programme readers might have imagined the desultory flap of a St. George's flag and discerned a thematic Anglophilia in this miscellany, neatly bookended by A.A. Milne. *Vespers* found 3-year-old Christopher Robin's mind wandering at prayer while moral intensity waxed in Belloc's *Cautionary Tale*, vividly depicting *Jim's* wilful escape from nurse at the Zoo and his consequent systematic ingestion by a lion.

The whimsical "honeymoon" in Lear's *Owl* and the *Pussycat* delivered the Nonsense promised on the tin as, energised by their *mince* and *quince*, the pair's beach waltz anticipated by a century Jack Vettriano's *Singing Butler*. Creative juvenilia and local interest combined in *The Visiters* (sic), written in Lewes and Bexhill by the precocious primary school-age Daisy Ashford, whose work, complete with solecisms and spelling mistakes, enjoyed commercial success and admiring comments from some literary lions of late-Victorian England.

Shakespeare's *Henry V* stoked patriotic ardour before Harfleur's fractured walls, drawing on the troops' warrior heritage and rekindling their spirit before hurling them once more "unto the breach" at the start of the Agincourt campaign. Sinew suitably stiffened and blood summoned, we joined Wordsworth *On Westminster Bridge* observing that *Earth had nothing to show more fair* than the unexpectedly attractive cityscape of early morning London, described as the poet habitually would Nature


There was a subliminal message for steadfast English yeomen as he was departing to visit his illegitimate daughter at Calais, a legacy from his *sans culottes* days when he succumbed to unhinged Jacobin *Sensibilité*. Sonnets from a trio of Great War poets illustrated the changing emotional attitudes to the conflict among England's warrior caste.

Brooke's unalloyed idealism and embrace of patriotic self-sacrifice in *The Soldier* yielded to Sassoon's *Dreamers*, citizens of *death's grey land* awaiting their ordeal, cut adrift from pleasures of hearth and home, now sustained only in their dreams. Owen's *Anthem for Doomed Youth* substituted tactical moves in trench warfare for elements of religious funeral rites and the ensuing mourning.

Next, we lit on the culinary rituals anatomised in Betjeman's *How to Get on in Society,* satirising a bourgeoisie immersed in Nancy Mitford's U and Non-U taxonomy.

Fortunately, our audience eschewed partisan opinion on the correct nomenclature for table linen or the arcana of pouring tea. Every English anthology demands a Philip Larkin lamentation and the auctioneer's invocation *Going*, *Going* despaired of the incipient physical disappearance of England.

After riding the wave of post-war iconoclasm in Kingsley Amis's *Lucky Jim's* chaotic pathway to giving a potentially career-defining lecture on *Merrie England*, we made land on the reassuring Anglican stability of Trollope's Barsetshire Chronicles through which, the author concluded, *ran the true savour of English life*. One listener was heard humming Flanders and Swann's *The English, the English, the English are best* as he left - and who could now disagree with that?

Icklesham Parish Council

Winchelsea and Winchelsea Beach Toilets

For many years the Parish Council have been in discussion with Rother District Council to take over the toilets at Winchelsea and Winchelsea Beach so it was a real shock to the Parish Council to learn that the District Council intended to market for lease the toilet buildings in Winchelsea and Winchelsea Beach to local businesses.

These are now being marketed on Dyer and Hobbis' website and stipulate that the business would need to provide public toilet facilities during their opening times. Due to the poor state of both these toilets our idea was to demolish them and rebuild so we asked for the freehold interest of both sites to reflect the massive investment that would need to be made, but instead we were ignored and they were put up for leasehold sale.

Furious Parish Councillors discussed this development at an Extraordinary Meeting held on 9th December and agreed to

write a strongly worded three page letter to Rother District Council, resisting this course of action and reiterating our interest in the freehold. The Parish Council also agreed to issue a press release, outlining our position to our residents which will be published soon. We will keep residents informed of any developments.

2025/26 Budget

The Parish Council have been discussing the 2025/26 budget making every effort to keep costs down for the benefit of our residents. The budget and figures will be formerly agreed by the Council at the Full Council meeting on 13th January.

Planning Enforcement Issues

The Parish Council have recently written to Rother District Council to formerly complain regarding the lack of planning enforcement currently being undertaken throughout the Parish. The Parish Council were not satisfied with the response received from Rother District Council and will be seeking the assistance of the local MP in this regard. It is felt that if they cannot do this, how would they possibly control the opening of our toilets if they sell them off.

Anne Gun Carriage Fundraising

The Parish Council held a fundraiser on 7th December at St Thomas' Church where historian and author Richard Ensor gave a very interesting talk all about the history of the Warship Anne.

The Parish Council raised a total of £718.76 and all proceeds will be used for the restoration of the Anne Gun and the building of the gun carriage. The Parish Council would like to say a big thank you to everyone who bought tickets and gave donations. The Parish Council would also like to thank everyone who volunteered their time to help organising the event and at the event.

Phone Call


An appeal on behalf of the public phone in the High Street.

If you would like to retain a public phone for use in emergencies when mobiles don't work, please consider emailing the Planning Officer at Rother DC. The real threat to the future of this phone line is detailed by BT inside the phone box but we can appeal right now.

A number of residents are very keen that this phone line should remain open. Mobile reception in this town is patchy, and if the mobile network goes down our High Street telephone line will be the important back up. There would appear to be no other public emergency telephone in the surrounding villages, including Rye. Icklesham Parish Council support the retention of this phone line as does the Winchelsea Conservation Society.

Conservation Society

As we reach the start of a new year, we of the Conservation Society Committee wanted to publicly thank our retiring chairman John Spencer for his tireless work for the society, and for the conservation of Winchelsea over many years.

In the last year, thanks to good sleuthing by committee members, we managed to track down and contact the owner of Martens in St Thomas Street and his niece, who has started a programme of repairs to the long-neglected house.

Similar hard work has meant we have put together a comprehensive record of the ancient paths and roadways around Winchelsea, garnered from a range of historical sources including local walkers, books, aerial photographic surveys, drone footage and LiDAR investigations.

This has enabled us to have a constructive dialogue with the National Trust which contributed to their granting more permissive paths around the town so we can all enjoy to the full the land and views surrounding Winchelsea.

We will continue to work throughout 2025 for the conservation of this unique town in which we are all privileged to live. *June Grindley*


