Securing the Future of the Little Shop

On Sunday 23rd March a town meeting was held in the New Hall to discuss the future of the Little Shop. The plan is to transfer the shop, which is currently privately owned, to one that is owned and managed by the community of Winchelsea. To facilitate this, a small steering group of five residents has been formed, and they have been working over the last few months with the current owner, Mr Stephen Rumsey, to see how this might be achieved.

The purpose of this meeting, which was attended by 150 residents, was to provide an update on what has been achieved so far, and the steps that will be required over the next few months. Mr Stephen Rumsey explained that his personal objective was to secure the future of the shop for the town, and he felt the best way of achieving this was through community ownership. He has generously offered to provide as much support as he can to ensure the success of the venture.

The steering group outlined what has been achieved so far. One thing you may have already noticed, is volunteers being trained by Nathan in the shop. These volunteers will fill the gaps created by Danny's retirement, and from early April will be operating the shop on a Sunday. In the future they will also cover Nathan's holiday's or on occasions when he is unable to work. So far 16 residents have stepped forward to

help, but we need more volunteers. We are asking for a commitment of only one shift per month. Volunteers will work in pairs, during their three-hour shifts and, as well as training, we are in the process of provided step-by-step guides on tasks like using the till and the coffee machine.


The steering group has also been talking to *Plunkett UK*, a national charity that in the last 25 years has supported over 700 UK community-owned businesses in rural areas with free, expert advice, training and funding. They will help us set up the legal structure, which will be Community Benefit Society. A CBS is regulated by and registered with the Financial Conduct Authority. It is an organisation which gives a broad membership equal stake and equal say in management and operates for the benefit of the community. The steering group has also visited a community shop in Benenden to see how they operate and their experience of working with Plunkett UK.

The steering group has also been working with the *Little Shop Association*, who hold funds left from when the shop was previously a community business, some years ago. They have been very supportive, and it is hoped that these funds may be transferred to the new CBS. The Association has an AGM in April where the committee will recommend to its members that the monies be transferred to the new entity.

Moving forward, the steering group has begun work on preparing a business plan and exploring what grants may be available. Currently the Little Shop makes a small loss each year. One of the purposes of the plan will be to see how the business might break even in the future. The use of volunteers will certainly reduce staff costs, and it may be possible to increase sales and margins, and inevitably we may need some fundraising. The good news is that according to *Plunkett UK*, the survival rate of community shops is 92%.

The purchase of the freehold of the building will also require funding. How much we will need is still being discussed but some donors have already come forward and there is likely to be the opportunity to purchase shares within the CBS.

There is clearly a lot more work to be done, and these things do take time. The steering group stressed that they don't have all the answers yet, but they will keep everyone informed regarding their progress and how you can help.



At the meeting those attending completed a short questionnaire; this is important to determine the level of support for the shop in the community. If you weren't at the meeting and would like to complete a questionnaire, copies are available in the shop. Early results from the survey handed out at the meeting show 92% (105/114 respondents) are very or completely in support of a community shop.

One thing that came out loud and clear at the meeting is that the Little Shop is much loved and valued by our community, but its future can only be assured with the support of residents through volunteering, fund raising and of course as customers. So please use the shop as much as possible, and on a Sunday be patient and encouraging to our volunteers, they may not be quite as fast as Nathan!

Managing St Thomas's during the Vacancy

The period that a parish or group of parishes is without a priest is known as a vacancy. When Jonathan Meyer retired on 7th February, the vacancy began but the work of the parish and the church has to continue.

At the Parochial Church Council Meeting in January, prior to Jonathan's departure, it was agreed that a working group would take on the responsibility for ensuring that all areas of the parish and the church continue to function. The group comprised: the Churchwardens, Gavin McFadyean, Charlotte Beecroft, Mary Parker and David Page, with David Harris as Chair.

The group meets online every Friday evening for an hour. This is a considerable commitment by the team to ensure that problems are dealt with very quickly and that the church is run efficiently.

There is a standard agenda that covers the following areas: enquiries received by email and phone during the previous week; the organisation of services including clergy, readers and intercessors, the contents of pew sheets, finance, routine maintenance and cleaning, requests for baptisms, weddings, funerals, burials and the interment of ashes; the sound and lighting project, requests to hire the church, the Rectory and the Rectory garden and arranging any special services such as the recent Ash Wednesday Eucharist.

The provision of clergy is clearly the most important aspect of the team's work and we are immensely grateful to David Page for his support of the parish and his recruitment of other clergy ensuring that we continue to be able to worship every Sunday. He also acts as our spiritual advisor.

Charlotte ensures that we have readers and intercessors and that the building is locked and unlocked, as well running a variety of events including the monthly Church Market. Gavin liaises with contractors and monitors repairs including the boiler and floodlights. Mary handles all emails and phone calls to the church during the vacancy. Celia organises all our meetings and ensures Sunday services run seamlessly. David Harris leads the team and handles any financial issues.

After the Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Parochial Church Meeting on 12th April, we will begin consulting widely amongst the congregation, town and wider community as part of the process to draft our Parish Profile, the key document to promote St Thomas's to potential new incumbents. It is important that we have a period of reflection before we begin the recruitment process.

Church Annual Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Parochial Church Meeting will be held on Saturday 12th April at 10.30am in the Church.

The Parish Meeting is held to elect Churchwardens and anyone on the electoral roll in the parish is entitled to attend and vote. This is different from those on the Church Electoral Roll, which usually includes communicant members of the congregation.

The Parish Meeting is immediately followed by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

Everyone who is on the Church Electoral Roll of the parish is entitled to attend. This is an opportunity for members of the congregation to receive an annual report on the proceedings of the Parochial Church Council during the twelve months ending 31st December 2024 including financial statements, the maintenance of the church building, its artefacts and the churchyard and any other matters of concern about the parish. Those attending will also learn of broad plans for the current year.

It is at this meeting that members of the Parochial Church Council are elected for the forthcoming year and those present are able to ask any questions. Papers related to the business of the meeting will be available two weeks prior to the meeting. It is hoped that as many members as possible of St Thomas who are on the electoral roll will attend.


Front Garden of the Month

Tawny Mining Bee

The Bee of the Bang

There's a famous quote of the British sprinter Linford Christie, in which he claimed he didn't just start races at the bang of the starting pistol, but at "the B of the Bang". The first few warm days of March accompanied by the eruption of flowers and birdsong really felt like that snap start to the headlong sprint of Spring. Blackcaps, Blackbirds, Chaffinches and Song Thrushes fill the air with melodious song, and by the New Gate the scissor-snap sound of Chiffchaffs can be heard above that machine-gun blast of tweets from Wrens, and further towards Wickham Manor the occasional Cetti's Warbler.

Incidentally that walk is botanically rewarding too as Pink Campion, Wood Anemone, Creeping Ground Ivy, Alexanders, Lesser Celandine Greater Stichwort and the last of the Violets are all flowering, with Bluebells pushing through, and a nice selection of ferns also doing well. Also at the time of writing, I came across the first Slow-worm of Spring under corrugated iron at Backfields.

This month I wanted to bring our attention to Bees, and in particular, Solitary Bees. Honey Bees get a lot of press, their peculiar folklore and history came to public attention when the Royal Keeper of the Bees at Buckingham Palace announced that he had informed the bees of Queen

Elizabeth II's death, and wrapped their hives in black ribbons - a centuries old tradition known as 'telling the bees'. Bumble Bees too, with their tea-towel friendly fluffy colourful jumpers are known to everyone.

However, it may surprise you to know that of the roughly 274 species of bee found in Britain, around 250 of those are Solitary Bees. By 'solitary' we mean species where the females are all fertile, they build and provision the nest themselves, and lay the eggs. They get no help from 'worker' bees. The male bees make an appearance to mate with the females, then go off and do whatever male bees do when not busy mating - feed or watch Strictly maybe.

It is perhaps because they don't have busy hives, and by dint of many of them being small, they go largely unnoticed. The Small Scissor Bee for example is so tiny it nests in the vacated holes of Woodworm. Those who grow campanulas in Winchelsea have a good chance of seeing these skinny black miniature bees, some 4-7mm in length, around their bellflowers. Great Dixter too is a good place to see them, having both bellflowers and old timber barns.

Despite their size, however, solitary bees are vitally important pollinators of many different plants in a wide range of environments. If you would like to see them in

detail then the 'bee hotels' you see for sale in garden centres do actually work when sited in a sunny open position. Easier still, just drill lots of different sized holes about 2-3 inches deep in a piece of untreated wood. Usually the first and most enthusiastic of occupants are those known as 'Mason Bees'.

The species I've photographed above, however, is a Red Mason Bee. In the photo you can see that one of the holes is in the process of being sealed shut with a door made of mud. The female bee, having completed the individual brood cells inside, stocked with pollen and nectar and eggs, collects mud in her mandibles, and then shapes and positions it using the tiny 'horns' on her face (hence the name Osmia bicornis).

Bee hotels can be dominated by this bee, and in particular by males, as they outnumber female Red Mason Bees two-to-one and aggressively compete to mate. I've even seen them fighting over a newly hatched female before she has fully emerged. After mating, the males insert a plug to prevent the female from mating again.

Those who grow roses may be familiar with the oval sections cut out of the leaves by female Leafcutter bees. These she uses to construct an exquisitely made green tube, sealed at both ends, inside the nest cavity. The doors of their cells differ from Mason Bees by being sealed with leaves instead of mud - their 'front door' appearing bright green when freshly made.

Mining Bees (Andrena) are an overlooked group of solitary bees, and yet they are the largest genus of bees in Britain. As their name suggests they tend to excavate their own nests in soil or sandy banks. Walkers passing through Hollow Field right now will see the chaotic mess the cattle are making, churning up the ground and tearing up grass. These ecoengineers provide perfect conditions not only for wildflowers to germinate, but also for whole colonies of Mining Bees to excavate their nests. Garden Lawns too can provide good nesting sites.

Last year, quite unexpectedly, Ivy Bees started a colony in the lawn here at Backfields, creating hundreds of tiny 'volcanoes' - heaps of excavated soil around a central burrow hole. Mining Bees can be very pretty, such as the Tawny Mining Bee photographed here in Winchelsea, busy in our gardens right now.

Winchelsea Beach Community Hall

Anyone passing through Winchelsea Beach in the last few months can't have failed to notice the building work going on at the Community Hall. The hall was originally built in 1981, and extended twice into its present form in 1982 and 1984; the facilities were definitely showing signs of their age, as the ladies of the committee were often reminding us. Sadly many of the people who contributed their time and effort in originally funding and building the hall are no longer with us, and we owe them a large debt of gratitude.

For those who are interested, the history of the hall and how it came into being is covered in a chapter of Michael Saville's' excellent book 'A Changing Shore', which details the history of Winchelsea Beach and its struggle with the elements and the authorities.

For some time the WBCA committee has been aware that we needed to keep up with the times and provide a full access disabled toilet, with proper wheelchair access and ramps. Many discussions took place on the design of the new extension, and those who are familiar with committees will not be surprised to learn that it was the smaller details which took up much of the time. Eventually, and after a false start, we decided on a design.

We did not want to have to close the hall completely while the building work was going on, which might have resulted in losing some of our regular bookings, and we were able to select a contractor and a design which allowed us to do this.

The new extension incorporates the full-access toilet which also has a baby change facility built in. We have an increasing number of young families using the hall and we hope that this will encourage them to come along.

The other side of the new space will allow us to have a decent cloakroom area. The clean lines of the extension have only served to show up the exterior decoration of the hall, and I have no doubt that it will not be long before we will have some internal pressure to remedy this.

All this of course comes at a cost, and we are fortunate in receiving support from Rother District Council, the Winchelsea Parochial Church Council (PCC), and Icklesham Parish Council. The rather sad closing and sale of St Richard's Church had allowed the PCC to contribute to a large part of the cost, for which we thank them, and we hope that this will be a fitting use of those funds.

The hall should be back into full use in April, and we will still strive to offer excellent value for money to all our hirers

The official opening ceremony will be on the 21st June.

Lorg Gawain Douglas will be giving and mini-lecture and reading to Literary Society at their meeting on Friday 18th April. This will take place in the New Hall at 7pm for 7.30.

He is an accomplished writer, teacher, performing poet and musician. He is the younger son of Francis, the 11th Marquess of Queensbury, and the great nephew of the poet Lord Alfred Douglas, who was also notorious for his relationship with Oscar Wilde. Gawain has written four collections of poetry and a compilation of his poetry, 'Fortuna', was published in 2009.

Gawain has made a special study of the works of T S Eliot, in particular 'The Waste Land' and 'Four Quartets'. In 2006 he recited 'Four Quartets' in Canterbury Cathedral as part of the Canterbury Festival, and gave subsequent performances in Australia and Scotland.

The Governments we deserve?

A speaker with a liberal sprinkling of stardust filled the pews of St. Thomas's church as broadcaster, journalist and author, Gavin Esler, contended that *Britain is Better Than This* a tour d'horizon of recent British political history. He initially focused on our flexible constitution, acclaimed by Pitt the Elder for its innate genius, by Walter Bagehot for its mystique "We must not let daylight upon the magic" and by Macaulay as pure gold in comparison with others' paper currencies.

We heard several descriptions of the constitutional role of *The Crown* - all enhancing mysticism in a veil of verbiage. Following World War II, Lord Tizard's verdict was more nuanced - Britain was a great country but no longer a great power. As the inventor of the octane grading system for fuel, Tizard did know a bit about classifying power. Are we weaponising nostalgia and substituting mythology for history to sustain a notional British exceptionalism?

He scrutinised the unhinged arithmetic of the 2024 General Election where non-voters formed the biggest group in the electorate and the Electoral Reform Society estimated that 8 million potentially eligible over-18s were not registered to

vote at all. Labour's 33% share of the vote secured a 63% seat share and a massive working majority.

The distribution of votes was critical; Reform's 4.2 million votes spread evenly across England and Wales gleaned 5 seats while 3.6 million, predominantly Southern, voters secured 72 seats for the Lib. Dems. usually by overtaking the Conservatives. Drilling down on the statistics reveals the current government as the choice of 17% of possible voters, raising worrying questions of democratic legitimacy against a soundtrack dominated by the barking of the dogs of war. The root cause of the electorate's disengagement is unclear apathy, restricted choice or a voting system where wasted votes pile up?

Our speaker was exercised by the advent of stratagems hindering efforts to hold politicians to account. The *dead cat bounce* imported from Australia, home of a macho political culture of which personal insults formed an integral part, saw interviewees under pressure introduce a startling non-sequitur into the discourse, intending to derail it completely.

Strategic lying was illustrated by Boris Johnson's meticulous description of reducing occupational stress by making model buses from discarded cardboard boxes and painting them carefully; although legions of Arts and Crafts enthusiasts, inspired by his example, still eagerly await sight of one of these buses. Liz Truss's conviction that she was unseated from the Premiership by a *Deep State* represented by *The Economist* and *The Financial Times* has foundered on a reef of scepticism.

Possibly anticipating accusations of circling the drain of despair and recollecting his religious setting, Gavin delivered a positive personal credo. The British were a brave inventive people, with Cambridge University alone sitting third in the global Nobel Prize league table, and by resolving some of the issues raised in this talk we could more confidently embrace the future in preference to our storied past.

Atmospheric temporary lighting last Christmas

Church Lighting and Sound Project

Nigel Ashton writes: A meeting was held on 27th March to discuss our faculty application, which as you may know was rejected in November and March. Members of the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) were present, including their architect Richard Andrews, also members of the diocese's building team. Winchelsea was represented by myself, Graham Large and John-Marc Swansbury (our sound designer). The meeting was chaired by the archdeacon. I outlined the project and then Graham and John-Marc answered a myriad of technical and aesthetic questions.

The key sticking points were as follows: The DAC didn't feel they had enough information on how the lighting would actually look. The architect said he needed mock ups to know what effect the lighting would have in every area of the church. Graham and I explained that the cost of this would be prohibitive. It was agreed that the architect will meet with Graham in church and Graham will describe exactly what the lighting will achieve in each area.

The committee decided that this was an excellent solution and would give them all the information required. There was considerable concern about the size, positioning, angle and colour of the new speakers. John-Marc agreed to reposition the speakers so as not to interrupt the view of the black marble inserts. There was much discussion about size and position of speakers and John-Marc agreed to produce mock ups of the new positions on photographs of the pillars. We will include the mock ups of lighting and speakers in the next magazine.

The committee remarked that their reservations about the positions and size, etc, had been fully answered. They were also concerned about the materials and colour of the new sound desk. We agreed it would be made in English oak and would match the colour and finish of the pews.

It was a very detailed and professional meeting and I'm confident that the faculty will be passed at the DAC meeting on 8th May. There are a number of what are essentially planning notices, which will be prepared by the diocese and these will be displayed in church for a month. This means that if we agree a tender, work could begin in June. The DAC congratulated us on a hugely impressive scheme which will 'massively improve the building and will be the envy of the diocese'
