Awaiting an announcement

It's hardly a secret around Winchelsea that the post of Rector has been offered and accepted. An official announcement from the diocese should come very soon but the wheels of the Church of England turn slowly and there is still some administrative process to complete before his name can be published both here and in the parish he's coming from. There's every reason to believe that he will be moving into the Rectory in the New Year.

Simultaneously legal process is going forward to create a new Benefice of Winchelsea, Icklesham and Pett. Jonathan Meyer was already responsible for ministry at Pett and the new scheme will formalise that arrangement. The Church Commissioners have published the details which you will find *here*. Any representations about the proposed scheme must be made by 1st December.



Bishop Martin was in Winchelsea on 5th October and we expect to see him here again early in 2026 for the licensing of the new Rector



Poppy Appeal and Remembrance 2025

This year's Poppy Appeal will run until Tuesday 11th November. Just to confirm that donation tins and trays containing poppy material are available at The Little Shop, The Farm Kitchen, The New Inn, Winchelsea Lodge, the Co-op, Sutton's Shop, The Ship Inn/Jamie's Butchers and the School. Purchases can also be made directly and online via *poppyshop.org.uk*.

As ever, donations will be gratefully accepted by the Royal British Legion (RBL) with gift aid being much appreciated. Donations can also be made electronically to the RBL Poppy Appeal, Sort Code 30-11-75, Account Number 01937121 at any time. It would be appreciated if the payment reference SFF24 could be used, for any donations made during the Appeal period, as that will credit the gift to the Winchelsea area. However, this is NOT essential. Donations can also be made by texting POPPY2, POPPY5, or POPPY10 (to donate £2, £5 or £10, for example) to 70545, or by using the QR code on the trays.

A stock of gift aid envelopes is available at the back of the Church for cash or cheques (made payable to RBL Poppy Appeal) and these should be placed in the Black Box in the Church, or in any box at the above locations, on or before 11th November.



We do hope for a good turnout at the New Inn Quiz night on Sunday 9th November, with proceeds going to the Appeal and thanks to Jerry Moss for organising this.



There will also be a short Act of Remembrance at the War Memorial at 11am on Tuesday 11th November, Armistice Day.





Winchelsea Community Shop Update

In October we held our second town meeting, to update everyone on the progress that has been made in moving towards community ownership. More than 90 residents attended, demonstrating just how important securing the future of our shop is to the town.

At the meeting, the steering group announced that a Community Benefit Society has now been established, to operate the shop. It's called 'Winchelsea Community Shop Limited' and has been registered with the Financial Conduct Authority. £42,000 has already been transferred to our new bank account from the 'Little Shop Association'. This money was raised when the previous community shop was sold almost twenty years ago.

Now that the legal structure is in place, detailed negotiations are underway with the owner regarding the transfer of the business. In the short term we will be leasing the premises, however our eventual aim is to most likely purchase the building. In the New Year we will be ready to launch a share offer where residents can buy a stake in the business and have their say. We will explain how it will all work at our next meeting in January or February.

More information is available on <u>winchelsea.com</u>, Rye News and in a newsletter available in the shop. It's already generated some lovely feedback, from those outside the town:

"My wife and I visited the shop yesterday, as we do every few weeks, and learned from Nathan and your excellent leaflet of your future plans. We live in Limpsfield in the Surrey, it too has a very successful community shop which is just celebrating its 25th year of operation."

"I was the last resident Winchelsea police officer. I am delighted that Nathan is to remain in 'charge' of the shop. I knew Nathan as a child and a young man and know he has worked very hard to make the Shop work. I do so hope the future of the Shop is finalised. It was and obviously still is a great asset to Winchelsea and the surroundings". Edmund Hobby, [sometimes known as Hobby the Bobby].

We would also like to take this opportunity to thank those amazing FOAM Cellar Tour guides, together with their helpers, and the generous residents who allow them to use their cellars. During September they ran six tours on our behalf, as part of the Rye Arts Festival and managed to raise a massive £1,395 for the Little Shop.

Christmas is coming and that's an extra busy time for the Little Shop. Our wonderful team of volunteers are already in place to help Nathan make sure everything runs smoothy. We will be distributing leaflets, picking up turkeys, helping with fruit and veg orders and taking care of deliveries. We've also had some kind offers to decorate the shop as part of Winchelsea's Christmas Windows.

And don't forget, whenever you can, help your community shop by popping in and buying something!



Peter Cosstick writes: It gives me great pleasure to announce that, on Saturday 18th October, members of Winchelsea Corporation met in the Court Hall where it was formally agreed that the Revd David Page is now the Mayor Select for Winchelsea. This unanimous decision was reached following full consultation of all Freemen of Winchelsea.

David will take up office on Easter Monday 6th April 2026, when I step down after two years of office.

2026 is a special year for the town as Speakership of the Cinque Ports Confederation will be transferred to Winchelsea on 21st May, and David will become Speaker on this date. This post is held for one year and comes to Winchelsea every seven years.

David was previously Mayor of Winchelsea between 2020 and 2022, during those very dark and worrying times of Covid. It's wonderful that he will now be serving in happier times, and fully enjoy his term of office.

David and Howard moved to Winchelsea in 2006 and both continue to be involved in numerous town activities. David produces the magazine, looks after *winchelsea.com* and does the admin for the annual NGS garden openings.


With much applause from the audience, this very successful evening raised £900 for Winchelsea Corporation to assist in supporting various restoration and renovation projects.

The Glasgow Boys



Rye Noir Soir

Local crime novelist, Chris O'Donoghue, greeted a Lit. Soc. audience intent on drawing the veil from novel writing as "Lovely people of Winchelsea". Some of the less restrained sceptics present were seen surreptitiously scanning the assembly in search of possible addressees. Doubtless aware of the maxim that "everyone has a book in them" he proposed to slake the thirst of any wannabe authors by revealing his own modus operandi.

He presented his own distinctly modular C.V. – ceramicist, modeller, novelist – and the requisite personality traits for the prolific writer: – solitary, self-centred and selfish. Energetic engagement was his prescribed approach to the task – "just sit down and write" and like De Quincy in "Murder as a Fine Art" placed procrastination in the lowest circle of his personal "Inferno".

The aspiring novelist should be "target driven", aiming for between 80,000 and 100,000 words. Our speaker proposed a minimum planning outline of plot, character and narrative before opening the sluices for any flow of consciousness. O'Donoghue classified plots as the work of either precision crafters awash in preliminary detail before starting or "pantsters" writing by the seat of their pants and surrendering the narrative to the spontaneity of the moment.

He placed himself in the latter category. The cast needs 2 or 3 boldly painted characters and between 4 and 7 from a more muted palette. The writer must maintain a realistic narrative but should delay editing and correcting until a

substantial quantity of text was committed to paper. Chris's wife was a journalist and sub-editor on one of the broadsheets and she edits his work. He would advise everyone to find an editor or even a beta-editor whose informal feedback was generally useful.

Nowadays, meaningful contact with publishers has become increasingly difficult and the days when they read submitted manuscripts are gone, although self-publishing has become easier with Amazon offering a one book at a time publishing option.

How does the prospective novelist summon that elusive Muse who would open the vein of inspired creativity? Chris advised starting with a picture of something concrete, citing how a description of part of his model railway layout generated the head of steam which sent "Blood on the Tide" rolling. O'Donoghue's thrillers are set in Rye and Romney Marsh in the decade following the Second World War and he is scrupulously attentive to period detail.

While many crime writers develop an almost emotional relationship with their principal character, our speaker arrived with one, basing his main protagonist, Detective Inspector Sonny Russell, on an uncle of the same name. Russell is the antithesis of the hard-boiled Sam Spade investigator fuelled by chain smoking, the bottle of red eye in the desk drawer and the Java jug bubbling on the shelf. He is a vegetarian, favours "*Breakfast Tea*", has Buddhist leanings and lives in a converted railway carriage at Winchelsea Beach inseparable from his Jack Russell terrier, Aggie.

Floating in this cosy bubble his only comment would have to be "Eat your heart out, Montalbano!"

WAAHS goes Roman

On Saturday 18th October the Winchelsea and Area Archaeological and Historical Society (WAAHS) held the second of their planned series of autumn and winter talks in the New Hall. On this occasion the Speaker was Blake Galloway, a young, extremely confident and engaging archaeologist and heritage professional who in his downtime doubles as the Stadium Announcer at Ipswich Town Football Club.

Blake gave a confident, thoroughly detailed and well-received audio-visual presentation on the Culver Archaeological Project (CAP) and Bridge Farm Project near Lewes. CAP was started in 2005 to investigate the historic landscape surrounding the Barcombe Villa complex, a 1st to 4th century Romano-British settlement.

Twenty years later continuing archaeological research now seeks to understand the historical environment present within the greater alluvial plain of the Upper Ouse Valley. CAP has become internationally renowned as a major open area archaeological excavation site, with university students, professionals and local volunteers all engaged in trying to interpret the local landscape and the archaeological remains.

Simultaneously, surrounding fields have also undergone extensive geophysical surveys that have uncovered additional areas of potential interest, including Roman Roads (and junctions).

Blake, who clearly retains a boundless enthusiasm for his subject matter, started at CAP and Bridge Farm as a volunteer and now works in a supervisory capacity. Some of the images he displayed included those of a surprisingly well-preserved wood-lined Roman well, numerous Roman coins, shards of pottery and even complete pottery vessels.

At the conclusion to his talk Blake compared CAP with the recent uncovering of sections of the Icklesham Roman Road, as well as earlier excavations in Icklesham that uncovered Roman tiles and iron-ore bloomeries.


