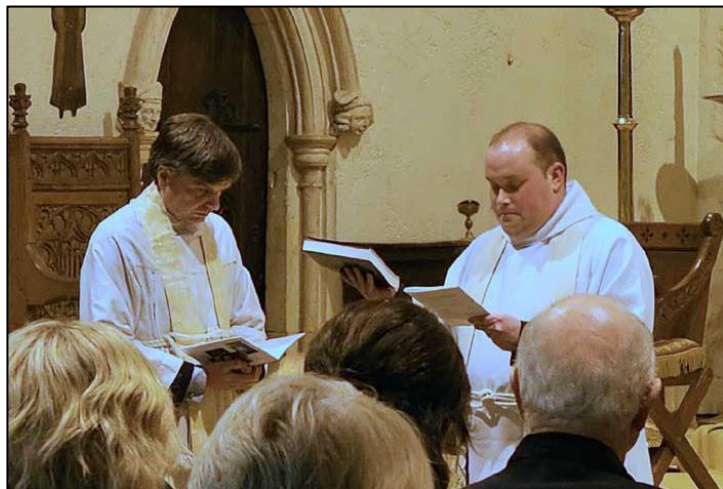


Welcome to Nathanael

Winchelsea church was full on 28th January as friends and family, members of the church and local community came together for a service to launch the ministry of Nathanael Hayler as Rector of Winchelsea, Pett and Icklesham.

In the specialist legal terminology of the Church of England, he was collated by the Bishop of Chichester and inducted by the Archdeacon of Hastings.

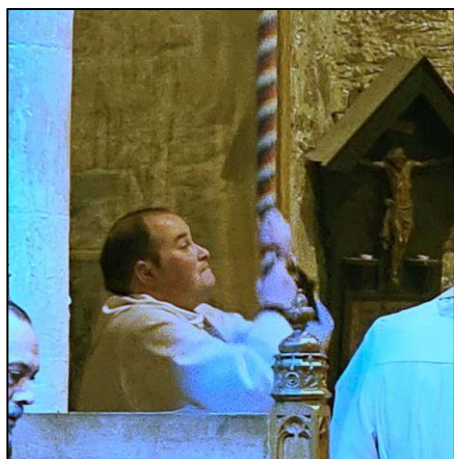
As Bishop Martin pointed out, the new Rector took up his role on the same day that the new Archbishop of Canterbury took up hers. In a sermon drawing on Jesus' Parable of the Sower, the bishop encouraged us to cultivate the gifts that we have all been given, exploring the mystery of the growth of the seed of faith and tending it in worship and prayer.



Taking the Oath of Allegiance

Having administered the necessary oaths, the archdeacon led Nathanael to the west door for the symbolic act of taking possession of the living, and then to ring the church bell.

After Communion, Nathanael gave warm thanks to all the people who had looked after the parishes during the year-long vacancy, to the team who had prepared the Rectory for him to move into, and to all those whose contribution had made the induction service such a memorable occasion.

An Invitation from the Rector

Arriving in a new and unknown place can be daunting but I have been overwhelmed with your kindness, care and generosity in helping me to settle in the Rectory and step into ministry with you. Thank you.

Later this month the season of Lent begins - an imitation of the 40 days Christ spent in the wilderness of temptation before his passion and death. On Sundays we gather in worship to prepare our hearts for the solemnities of Holy Week and the great joy of Easter. More widely, the season of Lent invites us to consider how we might grow in faith through prayer, meditation on the scriptures, and conversation.

It seems an excellent opportunity, over the 40 days of Lent, to offer space and time for listening. I want to hear your story, to learn about your faith and your doubts, and to offer a listening ear in whatever life holds for you at the moment. I would love to hear from you if you'd like to find time for a conversation – long or short, your house or mine, in church or on a dog walk. You don't have to be a churchgoer to be in touch and it would be wonderful to hear from you whatever your thoughts on life, faith, the world, and the church.

This is the prayer I will be praying daily in Lent this year; please join me:

For all the benefits Thou hast given me,
For all the pains and insults Thou hast borne for me.
O most merciful Redeemer, friend and brother,
May I know Thee more clearly,

Church Lighting Appeal Challenge

Those responsible for the Lighting Appeal at St Thomas's are very grateful to everyone who responded to the gift challenge set by Eric Rowe and Nick Shiren. In early December, Nick offered to match donations received by 31st December up to £20,000.

Including Gift Aid, we raised just over £20,000 which triggered a donation of £20,000 from Nick plus a further £5,000 in Gift Aid. Many thanks to everyone who pledged or made a cash donation, including the Friends of Winchelsea Church who provided £4,025.

An excellent result. We are now only £31,000 short of our target and are making applications to the various trusts and foundations who award grants for projects such as ours.

St Thomas's Church should soon have the quality of lighting that befits a church which is described by Nikolaus Pevsner in *The Buildings of England* as "grand architecturally and rich decoratively".

Talking about the Little Shop

In December we held a Christmas drinks reception in the New Hall for all our shop volunteers. Nathan and his partner Pauline were our guests of honour. A collection for a Christmas gift for Nathan raised £300. Nathan was delighted and has already spent some of his voucher on some wine and is planning a short winter break.

In January, we caught up with two of our regular volunteers (pictured above) - Angela Howitt, who moved to the town last year and Maddy Coelho, who has been here for more than 15 years. We asked them both to share their experiences of supporting the Little Shop.

Angela “We previously lived in Ticehurst. We wanted to live somewhere where we could walk to a shop, a pub and bus stop. Winchelsea ticked all our boxes! As having a shop in the town was one of the reasons that we moved here, I thought I should volunteer and play my part to save it.”

Maddy “To be honest I’m really not one of life’s volunteers, so I didn’t say yes straightaway, but it sounded a fun thing to do and great way to help the community. It’s definitely not a chore or boring!”

Angela “Nathan did my initial training covering the till and the coffee machine. I was really nervous before my first shift, but once you’ve done a shift you feel much more confident. It’s just like anything you do in life, you just need to throw yourself into it, get a bit of experience, and you soon start to feel competent.”

Maddy “I had never worked in a shop and didn’t quite know what to expect or what would be involved. However, after spending some time with Nathan I started to get the hang of it. Now that I’m reasonably competent I also help out for a few hours on Thursdays. It’s the shop’s delivery day, so Nathan can deal with all that, while I cover the till and coffees.”

Angela “For me it’s all about meeting people and dealing with the public. We always work in pairs, so getting to know my fellow volunteers on a Sunday has been great, in fact after spending three hours with someone behind the counter, you know them rather well!”

Maddy “I’m equally happy with the till and the coffee machine. I’ve opened up and closed the shop on a Sunday in equal measure; at first it seems like there is a fair bit to remember but it’s all documented in the volunteers’ folder, which is very comprehensive.”

Angela “There’s been some funny moments, as other volunteers know the measuring scales in the shop can be a bit temperamental. But customers are very understanding, they know that without us, the shop wouldn’t open on a Sunday”.

Maddy “On my first training session I spurted milk all over the shop, or at least all over the coffee machine and myself! Also, in my early days I calculated the cost of two tomatoes as over £10! I must have got the decimal point in the wrong place! I know not everyone has the time, but I recommend volunteers go into the shop as much as possible to familiarise themselves with everything. Its then less stressful and much more enjoyable.”

Angela “All of us volunteers can think of improvements we might make once it becomes a community shop? Some new scales would be top of my list. It would be good to smarten

the shop up, maybe give it a coat of paint and consider stocking some high-quality frozen meals, for both fulltime residents and those staying at the weekend.”

Maddy “It would be nice to have some locally produced ready meals or home-made cakes. Maybe we could do more with the first floor, increasing footfall would help the turnover. We could also use the town WhatsApp group, to let people know about a delivery or when seasonal products like asparagus and soft fruit have arrived.”

Angela “I would encourage more people to volunteer, it’s really a lot of fun, why not give it a go; and if it doesn’t work out for you that’s fine; but try it. I really love it!”

Maddy “Just go ahead and give it a go. It’s fun and you can learn new skills and meet lots of new people.”

Angela “I also try to use the shop as much as possible. This Christmas I bought lots! The turkey, bacon, pigs in blankets, all my veg and fruit, croissants, cream and I’m sure there was more on the list than that!”

Maddy “I brought a Turkey, Christmas veg, smoked salmon, bread and milk, we had ten people staying for five days so we used a lot of staples to keep us all going!

Thank you to Angela and Maddy and all our wonderful volunteers.

Icklesham Parish Council

2026-27 Budget

At the Full Council Meeting held on 12th January, the Parish Council formally agreed the 2026-27 budget, following careful consideration of current financial pressures and local priorities. The approved precept stands at £153,810 which represents a small 0.6% decrease compared to the 2025-26 budget. As usual, IPC remains aware that we all face financial challenges, and we continue to manage spending responsibly whilst continuing to support essential services and community assets. Thorough out the year we act quickly to maintain and improve these facilities for residents and visitors alike.

Importantly, the agreed precept also includes provision for future investment in the public toilets at Winchelsea and Winchelsea Beach, once ownership is eventually transferred. Our forward planning will allow IPC to act quickly to maintain and improve these facilities for residents and visitors alike.

Pitch Fees and Allotment Fees

At the same Full Council Meeting, Councillors agreed that recreation ground pitch fees and allotment fees will remain unchanged for the time being. This decision reflects the Council's commitment to keeping outdoor recreation and allotment gardening accessible to the whole community. These facilities play an important role in supporting health,

wellbeing, and social connection, and the Council did not wish to place additional financial pressure on users at this time.

Christmas Trees

IPC was once again delighted to install Christmas trees in all four wards this festive season. These displays have become a much-loved tradition, helping to spread seasonal cheer throughout the parish. We hope that both residents and visitors enjoyed the trees and a special thank you goes to everyone who helped add extra sparkle and decorations, making the trees even more magical and truly reflective of our community spirit.

Winchelsea and Winchelsea Beach Toilets

Following the submission of business cases to Rother District Council at the end of October, the Parish Council is currently awaiting a formal update on the proposed transfer of the Winchelsea and Winchelsea Beach public toilets. While we are still waiting for confirmation, we anticipate receiving further information ahead of the next Full Council Meeting on 9th March. The Council will continue to keep residents informed as soon as more details become available.

Renewed stage lighting and floor

When you go into the New Hall sometime soon, you won't fail to notice that the floor has been refurbished. It was new in 1997 as part of the structural rescue project and has been appreciated since as a good dance floor. Unfortunately the varnish is worn through in places and the Parana pine is not very robust so it has taken some knocks since.

We are fortunate to have received two major grants to add to our fundraising in 2025 to help with both this work (by a contractor from Pett) and also the stage lighting renewal.

If you look up a bit in the Hall you may notice that the stage lighting has been renewed - with low energy fittings now controlled by a new computerised desk. Stage lighting designer Graham Large has been invaluable to the New Hall in devising an achievable scheme and putting us in touch with a specialist in Rye Harbour, EWP, who fit cruise ships

worldwide with stage lighting. This work was carried out in time for the Burns Night bash.

We would like to thank our supporters who donate to the New Hall, participate in the 100 Club (number 94 won in January) and residents who come to the various fundraising events which brought in £6,841 during 2025, plus fantastic support from the Bernard Sunley Foundation in July of £5,000 which encouraged the National Lottery Community Fund to give £12,837 later the same month.

All these contributions have allowed us to go ahead with the floor refurbishment and the stage lighting renewal. We look forward to welcoming you back in our Centenary Year for glittering stage shows and with a series of exciting events.

A look back at Christmas

Although Christmas and the New Year already feel some distance behind us, our thanks go to Icklesham Parish Council (IPC) for providing the tree, and to Peter Cossick for the baubles. This year, the WRA supplied and installed the lights, which many residents told us made the tree feel especially magical. These have now been safely stored away ready for next Christmas.

Toilets at Monks Walk

IPC continues to work with Rother District Council (RDC) to acquire the freehold of the public toilets at Monks Walk. IPC is currently reviewing legal support for the transfer and has submitted business plans to RDC outlining how the toilets would be managed and maintained in the future.

Traffic Update

We are awaiting confirmation from National Highways on the progress of the proposed no-left-turn / no-right-turn scheme. We understand that officers from both National Highways and East Sussex County Council are due to meet to discuss the matter. We will be requesting an update from both agencies shortly and will share further information as soon as it becomes available.

2026 Priorities

At the AGM in October, residents shared a range of ideas for future WRA projects. In January, the Committee met to agree which of these should form our main focus for the coming year.

Speed Limit Review and Safe Crossing

Our primary project for 2026/27 will be to revisit the possibility of reducing the speed limit in the town to 20mph, with a particular focus on Monks Walk, in the vicinity of the school. Alongside this, the same working group will explore options for creating a safe pedestrian crossing outside the New Hall.

This group will be led by Richard Plumb and David Dickson, with support from Georgia Benn. If you would like to join the working group, please contact Glen Marks at ra@winchelsea.com.

Cycle Paths

We also discussed how the WRA might support the development of cycle paths around Winchelsea. Jane Taylor recently attended a meeting with *Greenways*, the organisation responsible for cycle safety and route planning. Their current priorities lie elsewhere, but they have been invited to contact us if opportunities arise in the future.

Footpaths and access to the Station

Another suggestion was to explore the possibility of creating a safer pedestrian route between the town and the station. While this will not be a WRA project for 2026, we will continue to consult with the National Trust about this and about maintaining local footpaths to a good standard.

As we approach the new subscription year (2026/27), we would like to thank everyone who has already paid their 2025/26 subscription.

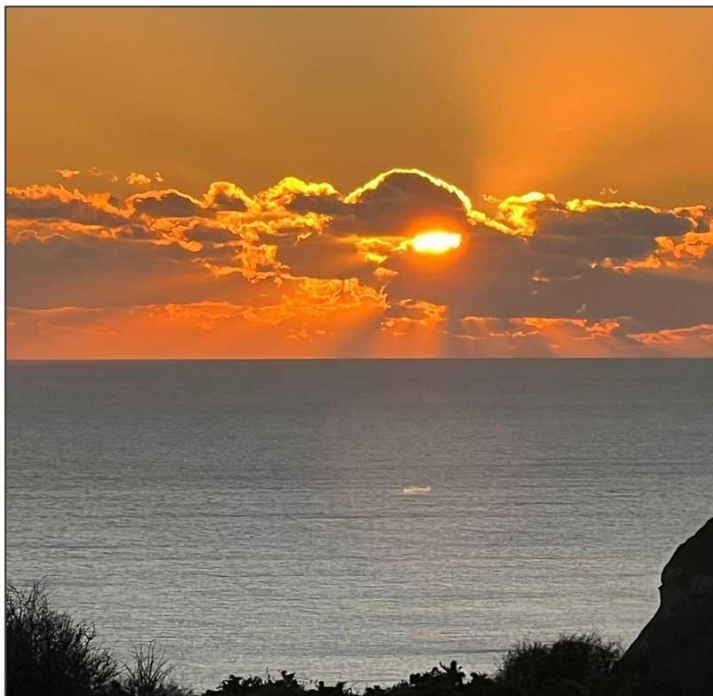

Literary Society

Peter Southgate is this month's speaker at Literary Society on Friday 20th at 7 for 7.30pm in the Court Hall. The meeting will begin with the AGM before his talk commences.

Peter last spoke to us about John Betjeman. He spent many years in the past preparing and publishing reports for the British Government on the criminal justice system, followed by similar work for the government of Tasmania. Since then he has written magazine and newspaper articles and books and given talks on literature and art.

This month he'll be talking to the Society about Raymond Chandler, the famous exponent of 'noir' detective fiction.



Poetry please

Aware Socrates had warned that the unexamined life is not worth living, the Lit. Soc. gladly welcomed local poet, Marshall Coombs, to entertain them by examining his life through the lens of his poetry.

The first port of call on this autobiographical voyage was “*Thirty*” where he concluded that his life experience permitted him “*a dexterous marshalling of resources*” to compensate for his diminishing drive. Meantime his inner man readied “*for a series of deplorable disturbances in one’s most respectable suburban areas*”. Such intrinsic, virile vitality seems preferable to Matthew Arnold’s gloomy assessment at the same milestone “*I am past thirty and 3 parts iced over.*”

Forty found our speaker in Hastings swamped in maritime influences – tides, winds.....and seagulls! Seduced by their languid flight, he is keen to share their synchronised awareness of wind and tidal patterns. In the tides, an earthly manifestation of the movement of heavenly bodies, he sees a metaphor of his own life.

A seasonal sequence of poems starts with “*A Lull in March*” in which Coombs hails “*the quiet waves*” of a neap tide registering their arrival with alliterative insistence “*slapping at the salt-scoured shingle on the empty shore*” before

Summer's "*welter of days*" initially stretches and then contracts leaving the poet atop Hastings' East Hill reminiscing in his evocative piece "*September Sunlight*":- "*The light of the essential*" initiating a play "*of beams and shadows*", "*like a rich Book of Hours, not sharp as Spring*". These reflections trigger the realisation that it's "*Time to move on....*" and leave the world of Jonathan Livingstone Seagull and ornithological spirituality.

A Memory breaks to the England of the 50s and the poem's striking layout is littered with broken lines. Continuing the homage to "The Seven Ages of Man" "*At Seventy*" imagines that the poet's cranium encloses memories which ricochet round its vault. Within the memories, the perception of distant, departed days is no longer as through the glass rainbow of Chartres Cathedral's celebrated "*vitraux*" but rather a glimpse of the vibrant, discordant colours at the bottom of a vigorously shaken kaleidoscope.

"*Footprints in the sands of time*" feature in other recitations. "*Envoi*" records the plaintive request of the poet's 99-year-old mother "*I want to go home*" made from her care home life of "*diminishment and dissolution*" - an apparent indication of her readiness to embrace death – a conjunction duly attained within the week, the "dispatching" of the title.

In "*The Wizard Astronomer*", the 78-year-old Marshall ruminates on ageing and that spectral stalker, dementia, that paradoxical co-existence of immediate forgetfulness and freshly minted childhood scenes conjured from remote memory. Seeking the mechanism of illness he drills down onto misfiring "*constellations of synapses*", where amyloid plaques and tau proteins lurk mischievously among forests of nerve cells.

In the metaphorical "*Paper Boat*" (of Poetry) Coombs explains that, as helmsman of this craft, he navigates a safe channel through the perils of life's sea, seeking "*the current*" and "*the amicable shore*". Buoyed by his bravura performance the audience was confident he would find them.

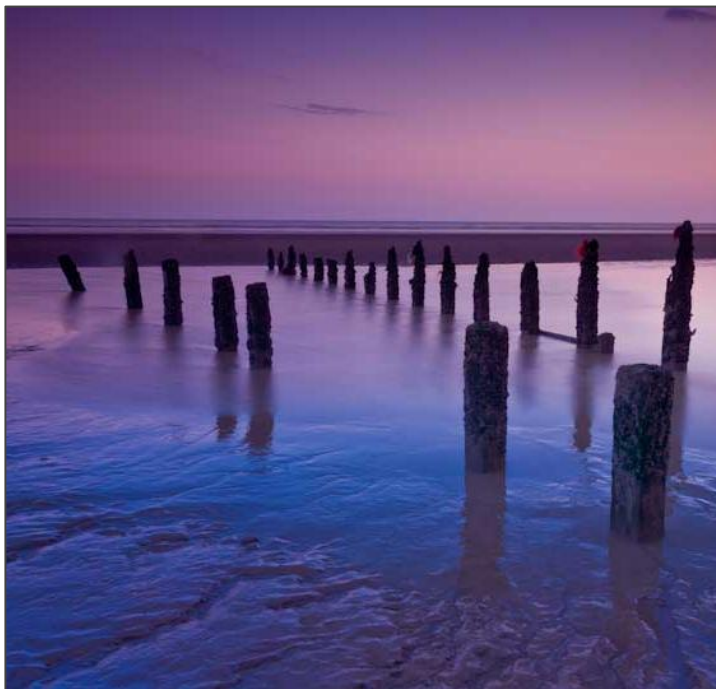
John Wesley's Chapel

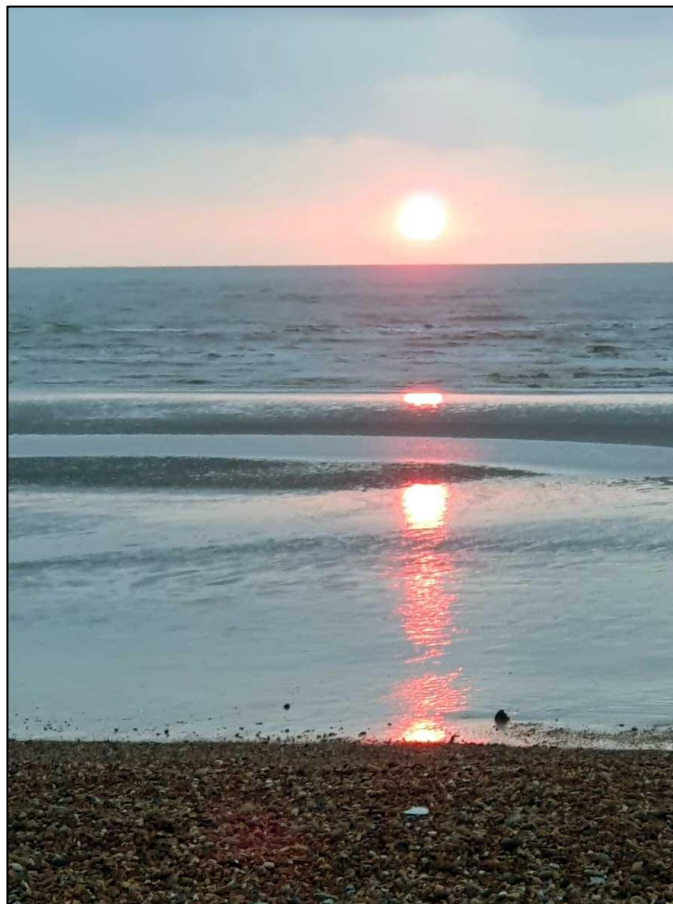
